Together for 60 years in Forrestfield

A MARRIAGE that took place in the Black butcher shop in 1989 and was a frequent customer Forrest, Germany, has stood the test of time with the couple now celebrating being together for 60 years in Forrestfield.

Heinrich and Renate Beuke tied the knot on November 8, 1963, and have been together ever since, with the couple and their children emigrating to Forrestfield in 1983 – the year of their 20th wedding anniversary, where they have lived since.

Reflecting on their special day, they said the best gift they received was 350 German Duestche Marks (roughly \$290 AUD) from Heinrich's parents, who sold a pig to get the money.

Heinrich, also known as Heinz, originally hails from the north of Germany while Renate grew up in the Black Forrest. Before coming to Forrestfield, they lived in Triberg and Freiburg, where their two sons were born. Their third child, a daughter, was born just out of Hildesheim.

Heinz worked as a master butcher south of Perth for many years, before then travelling to Asia to help teach others his craft.

He worked in Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines, Indonesia and China, and is still renowned for his smoked meats all these years later.

Since coming to Perth, Renate and Heinz have formed close ties to the Austrian-German community, a position which led them to presenting the one-hour Austrian radio program on 6EBA from 2009 to 2016.

Friend and founder of the German language magazine Treffpunkt WA Christine Nicol-Burmeister said she met the Beuke's through Heinz's to the store, calling his products a taste of home for the homesick German expatriates.

They were excellent products which we bought regularly, it was very good, very tasty," she said.

Mrs Nicol-Burmeister said that the Beuke's did lots of work for the Austrian club in Perth, with Renate running the kitchen and Heinz president of the club at one stage.

She said they now organise weekly catchups for elderly German speakers, giving them the ability to socialise, remain active and speak in their mother tongue.

The Beuke's celebrated the day with an afternoon tea with family before having dinner with

Midland Gate sold

THE Midland Gate shopping centre has finally sold for \$465 million to Melbourne-based fund manager Fawkner Property and international investment firm PAG after being on the market for more than three

While rumours of the sale were widely reported at the end of September, the deal was not finalised until last week.

The previous owners, Vicinity Centres, originally listed the 143,528sqm shopping centre for \$650m back in 2019.

According to CBRE's Simon Rooney, who co-negotiated the deal on behalf of Vicinity Centres, the sale represents Australia's largest single regional asset transaction since December 2019.

For Asian investment firm PAG, the purchase of the shopping centre comes after its recent August acquisition of Australian Venue Co, a hospitality group which owns more than 210 pubs, bars, and event venues across Australia and New Zealand.

The purchase of Midland Gate has also added to Fawkner Property's portfolio of more than 130 assets, including 13 shopping centres around the country.

On its website Fawkner states the importance of locally owned and operated businesses through what it calls 'localisation strate-

gy'.
"Fawkner Property provide
a direct opportunity for 'local' owners and supporters' to own units. By having literal local 'buy in', we can increase foot traffic, customer loyalty and local pride in our centres," it stated

How this will manifest at the Midland Gate shopping centre remains to be seen, as the Swan Chamber of Commerce, the peak business forum in the Midland region, has not yet been contacted by Fawkner Property.

Business owner and Swan Chamber of Commerce president Mike Matich said he welcomes Fawkner Property and its 'localisation strategy' to the community and looks forward to any potential developments.

"It's the big box retailers, the iconic national stores. They're the ones who actually bring people into the area, bring people into the shopping centre. But it's the local stores that give it colour, that give it life - that creates community in the shopping centres,"

Students' petition drives first steps to change in Kalamunda

SITTING unused for more than a decade, 12 Mead Street in Kalamunda has finally been put on the market.

Helena College students Izzy Eastman and Penny Blyth presented a petition at the August City of Kalamunda ordinary council meeting with almost 1000 signatures calling to either remove or redevelop the building.

Now that the building has hit the market, Izzv and Penny said it was an amazing feeling seeing the building go up for sale.

"We put in so much hard work and so has everyone else in the community, so we're just proud that it finally happened," Izzy

The petition they presented was part of a school community project and they said they were confident the work they put into the project will net them a good

The pair said that the community presented them with many ideas with what the building could be turned into if the sale went through, with some ideas being a boutique hotel or more hospitality venues.

"A lot of people were also supporting our idea of a women's trade centre," Penny said.

Socks had also been tied to the temporary fencing surrounding

the building, but most had since been removed. When Echo News visited the site this week, a lone pair of socks had been tied to the fence at the northern corner where the shops begin on Kalamunda central mall.

The two-story building is being marketed by real estate agency Colliers as a "blank canvas op-portunity" in the heart of Kala-

The Colliers listing states the property has permitted uses as a childcare centre, consulting rooms, a medical centre, a shop, offices or even a small bar.

The property is offered for sale by expressions of interest, which close December 6.

Burning prohibited in bushfire response

BURNING restrictions in the metropolitan area have been brought forward in response to the escalating fire danger across the state, including the shires of Mundaring and Chittering and the cities of Swan and Kalamunda.

Fire and Emergency Services Commissioner Darren Klemm said the decision was prompted by the increasing bushfire risk across large parts of WA and prohibited burning times will be in effect from Friday, November 10.

This decision ensures that we have a unified approach across the entire metropolitan area. It's not something we do every year, but it's necessary considering the conditions we're faced with," Mr Klemm said.

"The seasonal conditions are roughly five to eight weeks ahead of where they would typically be the bushfire season has arrived in Western Australia much earlier this

"The events of the last two weeks, which culminated in emergency services dealing with more than 100 fires on Saturday, mean we simply can't afford fire being introduced to the landscape any

Prohibited burning times across 13 local governments will commence from Friday.

This means landowners and local governments will no longer be able to undertake planned burning activities or set fire to bushland.

Prohibited burning times are implemented in consultation with local governments and make it unlawful to set fire to the landscape, including activities such as campfires, stubble burning, waste management and reducing fuel loads.

Mr Klemm said FESA had been speaking with local governments, who are the key stakeholders affected by this decision, and they had already indicated they were looking at introducing their prohibited burning times earlier than expected.

'Department of Fire and Emergency Services staff will be liaising with local governments this week to help them manage the transi-

He issued a reminder to the public to ensure they were preparing themselves and their families for the bushfire season.

"Emergency services, local governments and other agencies are all working together, using every lever possible to reduce the bushfire risk and prepare our state," he said.

"We're still not seeing enough people creating bushfire plans. The recent fires in Bold Park and Kings Park are a salient reminder that bushfires can still affect suburban

"Make a bushfire plan, prepare an emergency kit and stay alert because all signs point to a long, hot and severe bushfire season.

In addition to calling for submissions, public hearings are being held at the three sites, details for remaining hearings are below. Times are in local time zones. The Independent Reviewer will also be available for one on one conversations between the public hearing sessions.

Rechargeable battery risks

If you have a mobile phone, laptop, electric toothbrush, e-scooter, e-bike, any power tools, or solar power backup storage, you need to know how to reduce potentially deadly fire risks lurking in their batteries.

These common household items use rechargeable lithium-ion batteries which can be highly flammable. If these batteries are used incorrectly, or are damaged, they can overheat, explode and cause fires that can be dangerous and difficult to extinguish.

House fires, burns, chemical exposure, smoke inhalation and property damage have all been reported in connection with lithium-ion battery charging.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) saw a 92 per cent increase in reported lithium-ion battery-related incidents in 2022 compared to 2020.

Simple steps can be taken to reduce the risks, such as only using the charger recommended for the battery, unplugging products when they're fully charged, and charging batteries in a cool and dry place out of direct sunlight and away from combustible materials. If your batteries overheat, appear to be swelling, or leak or vent gas, stop using them immediately, and never use damaged charging cables.

Maida Vale south rezoning bid a threat to cockatoo hab

MAIDA Vale south residents Steve Walczak and fiancé Chelsea Morgan have started a petition opposing the proposed rezoning of the locality containing endangered forest red-tail black cockatoo and Carnaby's cockatoo foraging habitats.

The petition has already attracted almost 500 signatures, and Ms Morgan, who has a conservation, biology and zoology degree, said the best way to protect the cockatoos is to simply not develop the existing area at all.

"I just fear that the value of the flora and fauna in this area has been

grossly underestimated," she said. Mr Walczak agreed, stating "the only thing the developer can really do to not have a massive impact on species like the black cockatoo is to

not do (the development) at all."

The Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) is seeking public comment on the proposed rezoning of a 177.53ha parcel of land, located between Hawtin Road, Sultana Road East, Harold Road and Roe Highway in Maida Vale south, from rural to urban deferred under the metropolitan regional scheme.

The September 2023 WAPC amendment report lists the proposed rezoning area as having environments which range from excellent to completely degraded. The report also states the land contains forest red-tail black cockatoo and Carnaby's cockatoo foraging habitats.

Once rezoned, developer Monument Group has passed one of several approvement processes required to develop the area into an urban residential development.

Monument director Johnno Wroth

wavs studies had been completed and that the development will retain all valuable bushland and protect it in perpetuity, as the development will not complete any large-scale clearing or earthworks.

"This will enhance the habitat for bandicoots and black cockatoos,' he said.

"We have plans to repair and reinstate the ecology of the creek and protect the trees that currently don't have any protection and are mostly on private property."

Mr Wroth said the development is a 15-to-20-year project which is opt-in, with a majority of residents in support and welcomes landowners to stay in their homes for as long as possible.

ake Leschenaultia to close during extreme weather.

SHIRE of Mundaring will limit public access to Lake Leschenaultia during extreme and catastrophic fire danger rating days this summer in the interests of community safety.

Following the first year of the new national fire danger rating system a review has been conducted and adjustments have been made to the shire's rating system.

Based on these changes, the shire has also conducted a review of when it will open and close the lake on certain fire danger rating

Effective immediately, the new arrangements will see the shire close the lake to the public, but



open to campers on days where the rating is extreme and close the lake to both the public and campers on days where the rating is catastrophic.

Shire President Paige McNeil said the safety of the entire community is the shire's first priority, especially during periods of high bushfire threat.

"Lake Leschenaultia is our jewel in the crown for residents and visitors and we want everyone to enjoy the very best the Lake has to offer in a safe environment," she

The presence of a large number of people in a bushfire prone site with limited access has the potential to be devastating in the event of an out-of-control bushfire.

An emergency evacuation of a large number of people from the park would require support from emergency services, diverting these resources from other areas. potentially hampering response capabilities and placing other people, emergency service responders and property at risk.

The shire also acknowledges that the change in fire danger rating system in September 2022 meant the lake was closing on extreme days which caused concern for many residents and visitors.

"We were concerned that the rating didn't reflect the weather conditions we were experiencing so the shire made a submission to the Australian fire danger rating system after the first summer season," Cr McNeil said.

Visitors to the lake are encouraged to check the fire danger rating the night before they visit if they are planning to arrive at the lake the next morning, or in the afternoon if they plan to visit the lake in the evening.

The ratings are updated daily at about 4.30am and 4.30pm, with Mundaring falling under the Swan inland north district.

Darlington skater aims for Olympics

A YOUNG Darlington student is hoping to skate her way into the 2028 Olympics after placing first in a skateboarding competition in Mackay, Queensland last month.

Eleven-year-old Tayah Payne received a \$200 Shire of Mundaring youth grant to travel to Mackay to compete in the BMD Rumble on Reef skateboarding championship.

Over the five-day event, Tayah placed first in the 16 and under female championship division, and first place in the 16 and under street skate series competition for 2023

Tayah's father Greg Payne thanked the shire for the grant which contributed towards the interstate travel expenses to compete in the competi-

"We were very grateful to find out that the shire had this youth grant initiative in place to help young athletes like Tayah," he said

"It's particularly difficult for athletes of Tayah's age to come up with the funds to travel interstate when these opportunities come up.

"The grant money helped Tayah pay for part of her airfares over to Mackay. The rest she funded herself from a prior competition win which we are very proud of her for doing.

"I'm very happy and proud to say Tayah really gave it her all and skated fantastically," he said.

"Because she came first in the under 16's event, she qualified to skate in the women's open division which has now given her great exposure and the opportunity to skate against the top female skaters in Australia.

To our delight she placed third in this division.

Tayah is now on the radar to be selected into a new sports program which will be run through the WA Institute of Sport.

The program is expected to recruit young skateboarders like Tayah and help them on their path to the 2028 Olympics in Los Angeles and the 2032 Olympics in Brisbane.

Preferential voting in Swan

THERE were quite a few local government contests where preferences allowed under the new optional preferential voting made a difference, including in the City of Swan, according to University of Notre Dame politics and international relations professor Martin Drum.

Dr Drum said obviously the headline race in the City of Swan was the mayoral race where no candidate received more than 20 per cent of the vote.

"In this case we can see the benefits of preferential voting as many voters chose to preference the eventual winning candidate (Tanya Richardson), enabling her to win from second position in the primary votes," he said.

"This is a better reflection of the choice of vot-

ers across the council area."

But the optional preferential voting is not popular with everyone and the only readers to contact Echo News about the new system have not been

In his letter Party Politics (Echo News, October 27) Gooseberry Hill resident C Coulthard said preferential voting only worked at a state and federal level, so if a preferred candidate was not successful the voter hoped their preference would help a candidate with similar political leanings.

Dr Drum said the system for counting preferences in local governments was the same as it was for state and federal elections

"Whilst fair, the system for allocating preferences in multi-member electorates is very confusing and most voters would struggle to understand

Due to counting errors the results of the City of Swan local government election were not declared until late on the afternoon of Thursday, October 26, six days after polls closed.

Speaking at the October 31 meeting, newly elected North ward Cr David Modolo said that he was the cause of the seven-day delay in the deputy mayoral vote and apologised as he believed he did not have enough time to make an informed decision on

was the councillor who voted informally and I wish to put on the record that I did so deliberately. I am a newly elected councillor of this city, I was only informed, officially, of my election the day before the vote was held," he said.

"The office of the deputy mayor is an important one for this city, and I didn't consider the 24 hours was sufficient time to inform myself of the adequacies of the candidates who were standing.

Cr Modolo said he spent the seven days better informing himself on both candidates.

Speaking before the vote, Cr O'Connor said he will be looking to help the residents of High Wycombe south, Maida Vale south and will help to revitalise the Pickering Brook town centre as well.

"My focus on the residents of High Wycombe south and their plight as the painfully slow moving wheels of planning system in WA are having a negative effect on those residents and their lives in what should be their golden years," he said.

Wooroloo firearm incident charge

HOMICIDE Squad detectives have charged a 35-year-old man in relation to an incident in Wooroloo on the weekend Saturday, November 4 in which a 32-year-old man received a gunshot injury to his head.

At about 7.20am, police were notified of an incident on Needham Road, Wooroloo in which it was reported a man had been shot.

Police and St John WA personnel attended the scene, where it was confirmed a man had a gunshot wound to his head. The injured man was flown by the RAC Rescue helicopter to Royal Perth Hospital, but the man died in hospital on Sunday, November 5.

A search of the immediate area resulted in the arrest of a 35-year-old man, who has since been charged by homicide squad detectives with 'mur-

He was refused bail and appeared in Midland Magistrates Court on Monday, November 6 where he was remanded in custody until November 22 when he will reappear at Stirling Gardens Magis-

It has since been established that two men who were seen to run from the area into bushland had attended the scene with the victim, and fled the area on foot after the victim was shot.

The investigation into the incident is ongoing, and detectives are seeking dash-cam vision show-

ing either the movements of a blue Toyota Rukus wagon, with registration '1HZW 926', or any person seen walking or running on Needham Street, Wooroloo, between Liberton Road and Dinsdale Road, between 7am and 8.30am.

The incident resulted in a significant police presence in the area, including several specialist units, including the tactical response group.

At the time, nearby residents were advised to remain indoors, and keep their doors locked.

St John WA and the RAC Rescue helicopter responded to the injured man who was flown to Royal Perth Hospital.

The piece was entered into this year's Wakakirri National Dance Festival and won several awards, including the National Reconciliation Australia award.

"It is a privilege to be recognised for this work, and it serves as a symbol of the dedication and collaborative spirit of our passionate team of educators and whole school community," she said.

Tickets and registration for the event can be found online at Eventbrite, children 15-years-old and under can walk for free, \$30 for an adult ticket.


The inaugural Lift the Lid Walk for Mental Health was held in Mooloolaba, Queensland, back in 2016 and has been running since.

Challenges accepted at Haulmore Trailers

CHALLENGES accepted. That is the motto of Alan Moody and his transport company Haulmore Trailers, which celebrated its 50 year anniversary last Friday, November 3.

The celebration was enjoyed by Mr Moody, his employees and several long-standing customers who have business ties with Haulmore dating back to the company's inception in 1973

"We have four people that we are currently doing business with, right now, that we were doing business with 50 years ago. Now I think that's pretty fantastic,' he said.

Raised in Guildford since he was a boy, Mr Moody and his then business partner Les Troughton both took out a loan of \$4000 each to start the transport company Mr Moody would man the helm of for the next 50 years.

When it began, Haulmore Trailers mainly provided heavy vehicle sales, services and repairs to the agriculture industry, mining industry and transport industry, as well as building equipment for motor vehicle dealers throughout the

The company still provides these services to this day but on a greater scale across the state, including its rental fleet of more than 100 units.

He said the competitive industry was hard going in the early years, but when he got knocked down he'd always get back

"It was tough, very tough. You could still make turn over a lot of money and still make no profit, so it was very, very hard," Mr



These hard years continued until the economic crash in 1987, which caused the company to enter voluntary receivership.

After the crash Mr Moody continued alone, but always the fighter, pushed on and thrived.

The premises Haulmore still resides at 7 Tipper Court in Hazelmere, was purchased just three years later in 1990.

Over the past 50 years, Haulmore has trained hundreds of apprentices, who Mr Moody said are highly sought after in the industry and many of whom have gone onto managerial positions.

"Even in our small state, we have to do every type of work, and because we have the ability to take on a range of different types of tasks the apprentices trained by

us are trained to a very high level, and they are always in high demand as employees," he said.

Mr Moody believes the reason his business has not just survived, but also thrived over the years, is because the company conducts work with integrity and provides a good product that suits the conditions of Western Australia.

"The economy right now in WA is as good as I've ever seen it, it's on fire.

We've got more work than we can ever handle, and it's fair to say the rest of our industry is in the same situation,'

Mr Moody still runs Haulmore on a full-time schedule, turns 80 on February 3 next year, and said he won't be slowing down anytime soon.
