



I was initially pleased to read the article Indigenous leaders call for a week of silence after Voice defeated (Echo News, October 20). Great that *Echo* News had something about the Voice, the most heartfelt issue of

es the mourning.

The article begins with a reminder that "Australia has said No to an Indigenous Voice to Parliament", which was followed by a list of statistics for how constituencies states had voted, mostly

Then we are told that on the Uluru Statement website a week of silence to mourn the referendum defeat was called by Indigenous leaders, who also request others to join them in lowering the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flag to half-mast during the week. So far this is good community reporting.

It lets us know how Indigenous leaders and their people are feeling about the loss of their Voice.

But suddenly the final paragraph is a stab in the heart. No advocate Jacinta Price is portrayed as "fighting for better outcomes for the Indigenous population", which is an odd, subjective opinion to promote, at any time, let alone in an article about the loss of the Voice.

Price is quoted as

saying "We need better outcomes for our most marginalised, which is what I'll certainly be working hard for to ensure that is brought about in the near future".

This is such a cruel jab on two fronts; the one who stabbed the Voice to death, allegedly represents Indigenous people, which she does not; and allegedly she has the solutions and power to do the job of de-marginalising vulnerable Indigenous people, in place of the Voice, which she cannot do.

Only the Voice could have turned the tide for Indigenous disadvantage, but instead, Price turned the tide of the undecided voters from soft Yes to No.

Price took away the joy, and now she is given a media voice tacked onto an article about Indigenous mourning, as if she is the one who can solve the problems that the Voice was designed to do?

Where is the heart in that?

Can an Indigenous reader in mourning take heart from such an insensitive article about their heartache?

Firstly, unlike the Uluru Statement Indigenous leaders, Price does not represent a majority of traditional Indigenous people: just a small mostly non-Indigenous faction that is pro colonialism and pro assimilation; (Reference her Press Club speech).

Secondly, Price is not the author or expert 'de-marginalising' vulnerable Indigenous people.

It was the Yes campaign inspired by the Uluru Statement from the Heart, signed by 250 Indigenous leaders, that raised the 'close the gap' issue as a battle cry, claiming that only when Indigenous people have a Voice to parliament, and that voice is listened to, can the gap between advantage and disadvantage be closed.

This is because the Indigenous people themselves have the relevant knowledge for how to improve the lives of their most own vulnerable Indigenous people.

Senator Price is stealing the battle cry and thunder of the Yes campaign and claiming their heart as her own.

She led the No campaign beside opposition leader Peter Dutton, to defeat the Voice, which was the best option for caring for the marginalised Indigenous.

So, it is a political ruse to claim the high ground on caring for the marginalised when in fact she stabbed the cause in the back to the heart. With Price claiming

she represents the Indigenous people and claiming they would be harmed by the Voice, it was inevitable that the majority of the undecided, swung to a No vote; not because they did not want an Indigenous Voice to parliament but mostly because they now feared the Voice might harm the constitution and harm Indigenous people.

As more and more people realise the truth, they join those who mourn the loss of the Indigenous Voice to Parliament.

ing their voice, their hearts break even more. Without Price, and with former Indigenous senator Ken Wyatt whose role she replaced in the opposition coalition, a majority of Australians would now be rejoic-

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DFES warns: Finalise bushfire plans now!

Aerial firefighting fleet is brought on early to confront above average bushfire season

THE Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) has activated its aerial firefighting fleet earlier this year over concerns that WA is on track to have an above average bushfire season, with a special warning for Perth Hills and outer suburban residents.

WA has recorded its hottest September since records began, and hot temperatures and low rainfall are expected to continue in the lead-up to summer and soil dryness readings across the Darling Scarp indicate that fuel is drying out at an earlier rate than previous years.

Authorities have issued an urgent call for the public to take heed of warnings and finalise their bushfire preparations as soon as possible and to download the My Bushfire Plan

Fire and Emergency Services Commissioner Darren Klemm said looking at the forecast weather conditions and other factors like the level of moisture in soil and vegetation, he was very concerned that the upcoming bushfire season could be much more severe than WA has experienced in recent years.

"Mitigation is critical. If you live in a bushfire prone area like the Perth Hills or the outer suburbs, it is non-negotiable to start cutting long grass, trimming trees, and clearing any material around your home that could become fuel for a bushfire.

These actions make it much easier for firefighters to protect your home and reduce the spread of a bushfire.

"I'm hoping the fact that we are activating our aerial resources early will send the message to all Western Australians that there is an increased risk of an early start to bushfire season, so they need to finalise their own preparations.

DFES and the Bureau of Meteorology are monitoring the key indicators which are all pointing to the threat of an early start to the bushfire season.

Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson said nine aircraft are being brought online earlier than previous years and will be ready to

Ån additional four rotary wing aircraft, including two Black Hawk helicopters, are also on standby to start early if required.

An emergency warning was issued for a bushfire in Corrigin recently, indicating that the warm and dry conditions are already elevating the fire risk across the southern part of WA.

The state government funded aerial fleet consists of more than 30 rotary and fixed-wing suppression and aerial intelligence aircraft and is jointly managed by DFES and the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions.

Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson said the government was taking every measure to ensure the right resources are available in readiness to keep Western Australians safe this summer.

"We're calling on the public to listen to the advice of emergency services - make sure you and your

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Former York councillor faces fraud charges with partner

A FORMER Shire of York councillor is now facing two charges relating to an investigation into the misappropriation of funds from a community centre.

Former councillor Ashley Garratt and his partner Robyn Garratt appeared in Northam Magistrates Court on Monday, October 30 charged with defrauding the York Community Resource Centre (YCRC).

As reported by the ABC on the same day, former YCRC employee, Ms Garratt had additional six charges added to her original five counts of fraud by forgery and two counts of stealing as a servant.

Mr Garratt is now facing one count of benefiting from fraud and one count of property laundering.

Initially, only Mr Garratt's partner was charged after the police executed a search Heritage Council. warrant at a Malebelling home on Thursday, October 12

The new charges come after police conducted a follow-up search of their home last week

Ms Garratt was charged after five months of investigation by Northam detectives into allegations of misappropriation of funds at the community cen-

The new charges the 41-year-old is facing are one count of property laundering, one count of stealing as a servant, two counts of forging records, and two counts of benefiting from fraud. The couple are due back in court on January 8.

The York Community Resource Centre, a vital service provider to residents in the area, went into involuntary administration in July after experiencing financial problems.

"The Shire of York is in the process of taking over delivery of services from the CRC and re-opening the facility, and understands that the closure of the centre has impacted a wide range of York's population," Shire chief executive officer Chris Linnell

The Lumen Wheatbelt Regional University Centre services, run from the centre, are now available by appointment. Further services are expected to become available in November, subject to staff recruitment and IT provisions, but no date is set for the centre's reopening.

The shire will also take on the centre's debt and has allocated up to \$200,000 in the 2023-2024 budget – the shire expects the final figure may be

Eighty new aged care beds for Carmel

ROSHANA Care Group have opened Valencia Care Home in Carmel with a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by the Premier Roger Cook.

Also in attendance at the ceremony was Roshana Care chief executive officer Rosh Jalagge and Kalamunda MLA Matthew Hughes, who welcomed the opening of the centre and said that aged care remains a priority for him.

"It has not been an easy journey. It has taken seven years to bring this project to fruition," he said

"The main responsibility for residential aged care and home care support rests with the commonwealth government. What the state government brings to this area is the ability to assist with the repurposing of suitable state government land for aged care and assisting with ensuring local planning schemes facilitate the development of residential aged care."

The 80-bed upgrade will see the Carmel centre turn from a 40-bed into a 120-bed facility, with the extension officially opened on Tuesday October 17.

Mr Hughes said now that Carmel had been completed, Roshana was turning its sights to upgrading its Sunshine Park Facility in Lesmurdie.

"I am heartened by Roshana Group's clear commitment to proceed with plans for the provision of an additional 120 beds at Sunshine Park," he said.

"The determination and commitment to the provision of affordable aged care beds for the hills does not go unnoticed."

New Swan mayor outlines her vision

On Wednesday Echo News asked the City of Swan's new Mayor Tanya Richardson about how she planned to address the community perception of a council divided over issues such as the Midland Oval redevelopment master-

Mrs Richardson, a Guildford mother of four, said informed debate was healthy in a democracy and Swan ratepayers expected councillors to be able to have robust discussions as they plan for the future.

"But too much division can be counter-productive and we have certainly seen that in previous years," she said.

"With contentious issues like the future of Midland Oval, people will have different views and they will feel strongly about

"It's up to council members to bring those different views to the table while staying focused on the bigger picture of charting the best way forward for our community," she said.

"That's my vision for the council and it's one of my responsibilities as a leader to foster a positive and productive culture.

Not only is Mrs Richardson the city's first popularly elected mayor but she is also the first female mayor, following in the footsteps of the late Margaret Kidson, who was the only female president of the Shire of Swan, which became a city in

She said she would be focusing on her new role as mayor, but as she remained passionate about caring for people, she still hoped to work as a nurse on a casual basis when she had time available.

"I am passionate about nursing and have been for a long time, but being the Mayor of the City of Swan requires a significant commitment of time and energy.

"A community as vast and diverse as ours deserves to have a leader who is fully invested in the role.

"Thousands of people voted for me to be their first popularly elected mayor, and that's an honour and responsibility I will take very seriously.3

When asked about some of the issues or proposals she hopes to prioritise during the next four years Mrs Richardson said from the tourism appeal of the Swan Valley to the natural beauty of the Swan River and the economic potential that's waiting to be unlocked across the city, the community has so much going for it.

"We are growing at a rapid rate and it's up to us as elected leaders to guide that growth in line with the community's expectations and aspirations.

"There are major projects under way across the city, but as someone who was elected to represent Pearce ward in 2019, I'm particularly excited to see the Ellenbrook Leisure Centre come to fruition.'

Swan gets more diverse council

CITY of Swan has welcomed its first popularly elected Mayor after an historic election that delivered a new-look council with greater diversity.

Tanya Richardson, who has represented Pearce ward since 2019, was declared the winner of a close mayoral contest at the Midland Town Hall on Thursday, October 26.

She finished the count with 10.212 votes after preferences, ahead of Ian Johnson (9661), who was comfortably re-elected in Midland Guildford ward

The new council will have more female members than males.

The election also delivered an injection of youth, with two of the successful candidates in

In Whiteman Ward, 21-year-old Haeden Miles

won his seat on preferences, finishing 30 votes ahead of Mel Congerton, a long-serving former councillor and deputy Mayor.

Voters in Pearce, the city's most populous ward, elected 29-year-old Ellenbrook woman Evia Aringo

Councillor-elect Aringo was born in a Ugandan refugee camp and migrated to Australia at the age of nine.

She was elected alongside Cate McCullough, who retained the seat she has held in Pearce ward since 2015.

Amanda Dorn was a clear winner in Altone ward, where she will replace retiring former mayor David Lucas.

Rashelle Predovnik retained her seat in Midland Guildford ward, while Rod Henderson was Continued page 20.

Cassius is Forever 15

A REFLECTION or remembrance space not only of her son, but also an inspiration for other young children, is how Cassius Turvey's mother Mechelle likes to remember the memorial unveiled in Midland on Tuesday.

The remembrance plaque depicts 15 qualities that Cassius embodied and wording put together by her niece Rachel and her daughter, (Mrs Turvey's granddaughter) Sharlise who went and sat in the area and thought about the concept.

She said it was really important that not everything was about Cassius, so the wording on the plaque was a message to all other children that in the 15 short years that Cassius lived they too could have those qualities, if they didn't already have them.

The 15 qualities are sharing, sense of brother-hood and sisterhood, respectful, courageous, confident, teamwork, encouraging, kind, loyal, leadership, empowering, integrity, trustful, responsible and supportive.

Mrs Turvey highlighted the impact Cassius had with his friends and his family, especially the old people with his respect values while he was living and the impact he was still having on them.

"He would go to the old nanas, and he'd hug them while the other kids stayed back, he would go to the pops and shake their hands. He wouldn't run away, he would stay there and he would yarn. That's how Cassius learnt how to be respectful, that's how he learnt his culture.

"I carry everything for Cassius now – I wish I didn't have to but I live for him now and the fact is he'd be really proud of me doing what I'm doing to help other people.

"He had a saying 'mum's on a mission'.

"It's been pretty full on for the past year but I would do anything for my son."

She outlined why she chose Weeip Park for the remembrance plaque.

"Pretty much most nights and in between here and the Swan City Youth Service they'd come and throw some hoops here and get home very late at night, so that's why I've chosen this area because it's not just somewhere Cassius used to venture to but also his friends as well."

The unveiling was held on October 31 as Halloween was Cassius' favourite day of the year.

"Christmas and birthdays were a little bit okay but I think for Halloween he just loved getting out to the houses, meeting other kids as well – I think he just liked stepping out into the community and getting a hell of a lot of lollies."

Mrs Turvey finished addressing the crowd at the memorial by thanking friends, family and the wider community for their support.

"People come and say sorry for your loss and I just whisper in their ear gently, 'he was everyone's loss'," she said.





Red Hill waste facility gets \$200,000 grant

EASTERN Metropolitan Regional Council (EMRC) has received a \$200,000 state government funding boost under the WasteSorted organics infrastructure program.

EMRC currently operates a mobile aerated floor system (MAF) to process the food organics garden organics (FOGO) material delivered to its Red Hill waste management facility.

Contaminated FOGO material is adding to the spread of windblown litter, odour and emissions at the MAF processing site.

Under the funding arrangement, EMRC will construct a purpose-built hardstand to accommodate the processing site and the project is to add on a picking station to remove the contaminants before processing of the organic material.

The council is one of five operators of organics recycling facilities to share \$850,000 in funding under the WasteSorted program, with each operator receiving a grant of up to \$200,000.

These grants will help organics processing facilities meet the outcomes of the state government's better practice organics recycling guideline to improve environmental sustainability in their opera-

The projects have been selected to fast-track infrastructure upgrades, and support the processing



of FOGO collected by local governments

This infrastructure will support many of the 18 WA councils that already have FOGO and increase support for the further 12 committed to the rollout

EMRC joins the City of Albany, Resource Recovery Group, Purearth and C-Wise Holdings organics processing facilities that have been selected to receive funding.

Environment Minister Reece Whitby said the grants would add to a range of existing funding the state government is providing to support the FOGO roll-out in WA, including the recently announced food waste for healthy soils program.



Getting ready for the hot summer

underway across the Western Power network to minimise bushfire risk, increase network resilience and improve reliability for the commu nity ahead of the forecasted hot summer.

With the Bureau of Meteorology signalling increased risk of heatwaves and bushfires this year, Western Power is ensuring the network is as prepared as possible for potential extreme weather conditions.

Western Power Executive Manager of Asset Management Gair Landsborough said that while extensive summer preparedness work was part of annual ongoing maintenance and renewal, the increasing impacts of climate change meant work had expanded.

"We continually refine our operations to ensure we're improving the way assets are managed, including the 860,000 poles in the network," he

"We've got a comprehensive poles and wires maintenance program and bushfire mitigation program which includes insulator replacements, managing trees and vegetation near wires, and

EXTENSIVE summer preparedness work is have increased the helicopter cleaning of insula-

Mr Landsborough said the work was part of the usinesses drive towards ensuring network resir ience and safety ahead of the summer months.

"We build in resilience two ways, first, by taking steps to reduce the risk of faults on the network and secondly by ensuring we have the resources to respond when there is an issue.

"This year we've added more emergency response generators and high voltage injection units and have continued upgrading distribution transformers and feeders across Perth's suburbs and regional areas.

'We are making changes to load balancing and switching patterns to better distribute high electricity demand and reduce pressure on network infrastructure.

"While 100 per cent reliability cannot be guaranteed and climate change is having an increasing impact on our operations, we're finding new ways to minimise outages by bolstering the network where possible to maintain our 99.91 per cent reliability record."

Defence outlines steps for scheme water access

AS part of the PFAS investigation and management program affected Bullsbrook residents have received an update about what they need to do to be able to access scheme water at their properties.

The Department of Defence has said it will fund the connection of all residential properties to the scheme water network where those properties are within the Pearce air base management area and rely on bore water for household purposes.

Defence will provide construction of the scheme water infrastructure mains, connection of individual properties to scheme water infrastructure and necessary plumbing modifications to residences.

It will also provide reinstate disturbed ground following plumbing works to the extent practicable.

The connection process involves installing a point of connection to the new water service and plumbing works to connect the property with the mains point of connec-

Property owners who want to connect to scheme water need to sign a consent to enter property form.

Once the form is signed a Defence-approved civil contractor will be authorised to enter the property to start the process necessary to install a point of connection to the new scheme water service pipeline.

If Defence does not receive a

signed consent to enter property form from the owner, a point of connection cannot be installed at the property and the property will not be connected to scheme water under Defence's program.

At the community session in Bullsbrook on October 25 assistant Defence minister Matt Thistlethwaite said the federal government would now pay water usage and water service fees for eight years up from the previous commitment

In West Bullsbrook 188 properties will have the option to connect to the 14.2km pipeline with water supplied from the Ellenbrook tank.

Seventeen properties in South Bullsbrook will be able to connect and their water source will be a tank on Chittering Road.

The Department of Defence brochure available at the community session says the Water Corporation needs to carry out upgrades in Bullsbrook before the South Bullsbrook pipeline can be commissioned.

Construction of the West Bullsbrook pipeline requires trenching and horizontal drilling under the Tonkin Highway and the railway line at two locations.

Defence said to treat the water to Water Corporation standards a water treatment facility would be built on Robinson Road west of Tonkin Highway.

Construction of the scheme water infrastructure is forecast to start in April next year.



The people of Guildford and St Matthew's Church have continued the Gunners' Day tradition, which started in 1930.

THE annual Gunners' Day march and service, which has historical ties to Guildford, will be held in Stirling Square on Sunday, November 5.

Organised by the Royal Aus-Artillery of WA the event honours and commemorates those who have fought with the Artillery from Gallipoli, France, Korea to Viet-

In November 1913 the 38th Battery Field Artillery marched into Guildford prior to moving into the newly established depot and artillery headquarters at South Guildford.

The battery was welcomed by the Guildford community and the then governor Major-General Sir Harry Barron spoke of the importance of the unit and the responsibility of the community to look after them.

A year later, these men

marched out to war as the 8th Battery 3rd AIF, serving at Gal-

lipoli and on the Western Front. In 1919 the Regiment laid up their flag at St Matthew's Church, their Garrison Church.

The people of Guildford and St Matthew's Church have continued the tradition of support to the artillery men or Gunners from 1913 to present times with a Gunners' Day service and

This originated in 1930 and has continued since then apart from COVID-19 restrictions.

The historic ceremonial occasion welcomes Gunners, their families and visitors to share in the commemoration.

New vaping prevention campaign for youngsters

A NEW vaping prevention campaign 'clear the air' was launched by Cancer Council WA last week, which aims to educate young people on the health impacts of e-cigarette use.

The state government provided \$375,000 in funding to Cancer Council WA to develop the campaign, which complements other initiatives – including the WA school's anti-vaping toolkit, and more than \$2.4 million to deliver the 'make smoking history' campaign over the next three years.

As part of the 'clear the air' campaign, four digital advertisements - called Rotten Fruit - highlight to

young people aged 14 to 24 years the dangers behind the deceptive fruity flavours in vapes.

Research has found that e-cigarette use is socially acceptable among young people and is seen as more appealing than tobacco cigarettes due to the flavours and taste.

However, e-cigarettes can contain more than 240 toxic chemicals like weed killer, cleaning products, and paint strip-per, as well as nicotine.

Health Minister Amber-Jade Sanderson said vapes contain many toxic substances, including nicotine, which is a highly addictive and dangerous poison, and are designed to appeal to

young people.
"People who vape are three times more likely to take up smoking, so it is important we are doing everything we can to keep our young people safe.

"The vaping prevention campaign is part of the state government's approach to prevent and reduce vaping among young peo-

The ads will be visible across social media channels, streaming services, and mobile apps; along with also directing people to visit the 'clear the air' website for more information and tips on how to quit.

Fire danger rating system – what does it mean for you?

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AF-DRS) is used to describe the level of potential danger should a bushfire start.

The new system, introduced in 2022, helps City of Swan residents decide what action to take to protect themselves and their families from the impact of bushfires.

Each day, the Bureau of Meteorology uses local weather data to calculate the next day's fire danger as either moderate, high, extreme, catastrophic or

On days when a rating is declared, residents need to take the following actions:

Moderate: Plan and prepare – most fires can be

High: Be ready to act – fires will be dangerous

Extreme: Act now to protect life and property fires will spread quickly and be extremely danger-

Catastrophic: Leave bushfire risk areas for your survival – if a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost

No rating: Remain alert - fires are unlikely to spread dangerously.

If you live or work in a bushfire risk area this summer, it is your responsibility to keep up to date with the AFDRS so you can plan and take appropriate action to protect vourself and others.

Current and predicted fire danger ratings can be found on the Bureau of Meteorology website or the Emergency WA website



INSTALL YOUR FIREBREAKS

The City of Swan require all properties over 5,000sqm to install internal boundary firebreaks.

While it's unlikely that firebreaks will stop an intense fire, they will slow of maybe even stop a low intensity fire. They also provide important access for fire trucks to combat a fire.

Firebreaks must be:

- 3 metres wide with a 4 metres vertical height clearance.
- cleared of all flammable material,
- have sweeping corners to allow rooms for fire trucks to turn, and
- located inside, and as close as practicable, to the properties boundary.

Narrow firebreaks or firebreaks that end abruptly are hazardous for fire fighters. Please ensure your firebreaks meets standard.





- Sit down and discuss it with your family members.
- Practice your plan.
- Have a plan for your animals as they can't stay in an evacuation centre unless you have an assistance dog.
- Keep your finger on the pulse utilise www.emergency.wa.gov.au for up-to-date incidents and warnings in your area or see the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) Facebook and Twitter pages.
- Use resources available to you such as the free Fire Hazard Inspection service offered by the Shire. It can help identify hazards on your property and provide advice about how to best reduce/remove them. Join a Bush Fire Ready Group or if your street doesn't have one, start one and access resources from facilitators and DFES.

From page 5. returned in Swan Valley Gidgegannup ward, where he received more than one third of the vote.

Mrs Richardson said she would be a strong advocate for the city, and the community groups that make it such a diverse and vibrant place.

"I'm honoured that the City of Swan community has put their faith in me to lead the council," she

"I want to see the city grow and realise its incredible potential but I will always prioritise our 'As a nurse, I know how important it is to listen,

and I understand that health and wellbeing are what people value most." She has been chosen to lead the city as it enters

the Metronet Morley-Ellenbrook line is expected to be operational by the end of 2024. The city has an enviable combination of herit-

age, natural assets, diversity and economic potential with the new-look council responsible for setting the strategic direction.

This is a new beginning for the council and I'm excited about what we can achieve over the next four years," she said.

"It's an opportunity for us to take stock and think about how we can do a better job for the commu-

With the introduction of optional preferential voting and a popularly elected mayor, the vote count was expected to take longer than usual, especially with a field of 10 mayoral candidates.

However, the results were only declared late on Thursday October 26 six days after polls closed.

The Western Australian Electoral Commission, which the city appointed to run the election, ordered two recounts of the mayoral vote because of counting 'discrepancies'.

The city said it has been assured its ratepayers will not bear the costs of the delays.

This year's voter participation rate was about 30 per cent, the highest in six years.

Local govt reforms

THE state government continues to progress the most substantial local government reforms in more than 25 years, through new recently published regulations.

These regulations continue the delivery of reforms legislated by the Western Australian Parliament earlier this year, and follow major changes to council elections that are already in effect.

All larger local governments will now be required, by law, to live stream council meetings, and to place video recordings online. Smaller local governments are required, at a minimum, to publish audio recordings of meetings.

While many local governments have already made this change, a transition-in period will run until 1 January 2025 to allow the very few last remaining councils to install suitable audiovisual equipment. The regulations require local governments to keep recordings online for a period of at

These regulations also contain further measures to simplify financial reporting, to cut red tape and reduce complexity. Changes to the regulations regarding the valuation of infrastructure assets (such as local roads, bridges, and council buildings) will clarify that, in most cases, local governments will only need to determine the accounting value of the asset every five years, rather than every year.

This new measure is expected to substantially streamline the annual reporting process for local governments. This reform also follows the recent standardisation of financial statements, which has already simplified the reporting process for the 2022-2023 financial year, reducing the costs paid by ratepayers.

New regulations will also enable local governments to reimburse the education expenses of council members for any course that is relevant to their role as a council member. Local governments will now be able to establish a policy for how the costs of relevant further education - such as fees for short courses - may be reimbursed to council

The regulations allow for flexibility, so that courses for any topic areas relevant to a local government may be paid by the local government in line with its policies. This reform will support a broader range of people to serve on council, and members can continue to develop their skills.







Further rent rises predicted

PERTH and regional rental prices are expected to rise further, according to REIWA's 2023 property market quarterly update.

New records were set in the rental market in the third quarter of the year, with median house rents hitting a new record high of \$600 per week at the end of August, up from \$550 in December 2022.

The median unit rent price also set a new record, rising from \$475 at the end of last year to \$550 in August.

REIWA CEO Cath Hart said the rental market would remain challenging for tenants.

"The vacancy rate remains at an extreme low," she said.
"It was 0.7 per cent for the first half

of the year, and while it rose to 0.9 per cent in July, offering some hope of change, it dropped back to 0.7 per cent in September.

'Property managers are still seeing

queues at home opens and receiving multiple applications. Homes are leasing in a median of two weeks. Essentially one tenant moves out and another moves straight in.

"Demand is high and supply is low. This is unlikely to change in the future, maintaining upward pressure on prices. We expect to see median rents increase over the remainder of the year.'

House prices in most regional centres have shown a similar growth rate to Perth over 2023.

Rent prices have also shown strong growth, with some regional centres at record highs.

Ms Hart said regional centres were facing the same issues as Perth and this was putting upward pressure on house and rent prices.

Vacancy rates remained low in regional centres in the September quar-

Bullsbrook house prices skyrocket

PERTH'S housing market is leading the nation to record a double-digit increase over the year and set a new record median of \$631,195, with Bullsbrook skyrocketing more than 20 per cent to reach a median of \$525,000.

Domain's house price report for the September quarter shows Perth house prices lifted 3 per cent over the quarter, an annual change of 10.4 per cent.

Perth and Adelaide recorded the highest price gains over the quarter and were the only capital cities where house prices were at an all-time high. Domain chief of research and eco-

nomics Nicola Powell said if mortgage rates weren't so high, price growth would be even faster due to the chronic undersupply of housing

"Perth remains severely undersupplied," she said.

"The housing market continues to benefit from a positive flow of net interstate migration, record levels of overseas migration and being Australia's tightest city rental market.'


