Festival fiasco – know how to avoid ticketing blues

YOU'VE got your outfit picked and you know all the words to your favourite band's songs – then they cancel as a headlining act.

There are other bands to see but you're still disappointed and you assume you're not entitled to a refund. Well, that's not entirely true.

You have rights under Australian Consumer Law (ACL) when things go wrong and an event is cancelled or has a major change, such as the date, the location or the headliner doesn't per-

It's worth noting these rights don't just apply to music festivals and live concerts.

You have the same rights if the event is a food or arts festival, expo, sporting event, convention or other large event.

If the event is cancelled, you may be entitled to a full refund from the company that sold you

If you lost extra money due to the cancellation, such as from cancelling flights or accommodation, contact the ticketing agent first.

The ACL says a business must provide the poods or service it advertised

If the event goes ahead but is significantly different from what was advertised, you may also have a right to a refund on the grounds you were misled, or because you would otherwise not have bought a ticket in the first place had you known the line-up, venue, date or any other important feature, would change so much.

What happens if a support act cancels, or traffic delays meant you missed the first few songs of the headliner?

We recently saw this with the Robbie Williams concert in the Swan Valley. In these cases there may be grounds to receive a partial refund.

With any of these issues, in the first instance you should contact the ticketing agent to attempt to negotiate a solution.

If you have issues obtaining a refund or the ticket is refused at the gate, the event is cancelled or your ticket doesn't arrive, then we recommend seeking a chargeback from your bank.

Storm-destroyed transmission line rebuilt and re-energised

THE 220kV transmission feeder line into the Kalgoorlie-Boulder area was successfully re-energised on Sunday following a fast-track rebuild of the storm damaged section by Western Power in just nine days.

Five towers were destroyed by the extreme storm experienced on Wednesday, January 17, affecting power supply to the Kalgoorlie-Boulder area and surrounds. Power was restored through a combination of Western Power network assets, Synergy's back-up generator and a local privately owned generator.

Western Power executive manager of asset management Gair Landsborough said the transmission line was a critical piece of network infrastructure in the area, and as soon as the damage was known, teams across the business sprang into action to fast-track a solution.

"Our design and engineering teams developed a robust and resilient solution that could be constructed timely and safely, and we began procuring materials needed with a particular focus on using alternatives that we had in stock.

Specialist crossarms to go on the towers had to be designed and fabricated, and all materials and equipment had to be transported out to site.

"Logistically, this operation

has required meticulous planning and execution from establishing temporary access roads to setting up on-site mobile facilities for our crews – every aspect has been thoughtfully managed to ensure continuous progress and energisation of the line for the

"Despite the remote location, our engineers and crews have been working tirelessly to restore this vital link including extensive drilling into hard rock to secure new foundations and installing 12, 32-meter-high steel poles along the 2.5km work site in place of the five damaged towers. "Crossarms were then fitted,

conductor strung, conductors moved and clipped as required and additional earth wire strung before final checks and energisation of the line today.

"Understanding the complexity of such large-scale operations, we put comprehensive backup plans in place such as specialist crews on standby to handle any mechanical issues or unforeseen challenges.

Mr Landsborough said the crews outstanding efforts could not have been achieved without the fantastic support and collaboration from the City of Kalgoorlie Boulder, a number of other agencies, contractors, and suppliers.

"We thank them and most importantly the community for being patient while we repair the storm damage," he said.

"Additionally, the support of the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) during this time to ensure a coordinated effort was invaluable in minimising any disruptions to the community while maximising efficiency on-site.

"Every step was taken with two goals in mind: safety and speed. We understand the importance of this line to the people of Kalgoorlie and the surrounding regions. Every action was taken to respond as swiftly and safely as possible.

Mundaring doctor suspended

A MUNDARING doctor has been reprimanded and suspended for engaging in professional misconduct and must undertake and successfully complete a program of education, approved by the Medical Board of Australia.

On January 18 the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) ruled that medical practitioner Andrew Dunn, who has had his registration suspended for five months, must once his suspension has finished nominate an education course, assessment or program covering topics including sexual harassment and boundary violations as well as ethics and professional communication.

Once the training is completed the Mundaring Medical Centre GP has to provide to the medical board evidence that he has successfully reflected on his understanding of the power dynamics between medical practitioners and patients and how those dynamics affect interactions between them and how he would incorporate the lessons he had learnt into his medical practice

SAT also ruled the GP, who has been practicing medicine for about 40 years, had to pay \$20,000 towards the medical board's costs.

The statement of agreed facts said on July 15,

2021 and then on October 12, 2022 the medical board received notifications in relation to the GP's conduct both of which form part of the proceedings.

On February 6 last year the medical board decided to take immediate action under section 156 of the Schedule to the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law (WA) Act 2010 (National Law), by suspending the GP's registration with his registration remaining suspended since then.

The statement of agreed facts said in October 2018 the GP told a female patient in her late 20s when she sought treatment for a urinary tract infection that "A girl who looks like you, you're probably having it (sex) two or three times a day, so that might be too much. Sorry, I just had to say that."

In June 2021 a female pharmaceutical sales representative attended the medical centre and the GP made inappropriate and sexualised comments to

Then in October 2022 the GP inappropriately and/or unprofessionally made use of the personal information obtained from a woman at her son's appointment to visit her business in Glen Forrest and stayed there until he was asked to leave the

Community resumes John Frylinck search

TWO weeks after he went missing, 70-year-old John Frylinck is yet to be found.

Mr Frylinck went missing on the evening of January 18 at Sculpture Park in Mundaring, sparking a five-day search by police and State Emergency Services volunteers before it was suspended on January 23.

WA Police said an extensive area was searched and thanked those involved who assisted; however, Mr Frylinck was unable to be located.

After the police search was called off, Mundaring community members resumed the search, and by the time Echo News went to press, he was still yet to be located.

Mr Frylink is 180cm tall and is described as having a slim build with a small pot belly, white hair and a white moustache, fair skin, and blue eyes.

Police are asking members of Mundaring to continue checking for signs of Mr Frylinck in their gar-

THANKS to Rio Tinto's community giving program the West Swan Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade have been able to purchase rechargeable torches to assist in firefighting efforts.

Brigade captain Evyn Johnson said the brigade was thrilled to have been able to purchase the rechargeable torches which have already assisted firefighters during recent incidents.

"Safety is paramount when we attend incidents, and the initiative will further enhance this for our

members on the fireground."

The brigade attends more than 150 fire calls every year, anywhere from the metro area to regional WA.

"A large number of these call outs occur in the middle of the night, in locations involving challenging terrain, both by vehicle and foot, and without the benefit of streetlights. Without sufficient lighting, the risk of twisted ankles, falling into holes/ditches and walking into fallen lines is high," he said.

"Our appliances come equipped with standard torches that require

regular battery replacement. Consequently, there are occasions where batteries are flat or emit only a low level of light.

"As the fires are usually in locations that cannot be reached by vehicles, having sufficient lighting to hand is essential for our volunteers' safety as well as quickly getting to the job to extinguish the fire.

The grant has enabled the West Swan brigade to purchase four rechargeable Fenix WF26R 3000 lumen torches with in-vehicle charging stations for firefighting appliances.

New Kalamunda bus service and free travel on Sundays

SMARTRIDER holders can now get free public transport on Sundays, student smartrider holders can travel to school for free, and Kalamunda residents also get to enjoy a new bus service – the 272.

Kalamunda Learning Centre coordinator Bridget Hogarth encouraged everyone to use the 272 bus to get to and from the centre once term starts on February 12.

"This is great – the buses will run at exactly the right time for our classes," she said.

Kalamunda MLA Matthew Hughes said the new weekday 272 service is timed to fit in with the Kalamunda Learning Centre classes

"Down the hill the 272 goes at 9.17am and 12.17pm, on the way back up to the village it's 11.55am and 2.55pm," he said.

"It's a rare thing to win a new bus service... it's seen as a three-month trial, so we need passengers – I say, 'use it or lose it."

Transport Minister Rita Saffioti said a review of the 272 service will be conducted in May this year to allow time for patronage in the line to grow.

Ms Saffioti and Premier Roger Cook also announced on Sunday that public transport is now free for smartrider holders on Sundays and for student smartrider holders travelling to school.

"Making public transport free every Sunday is another way we're helping Western Australians manage the cost of getting around and comes on top of our two-zone fare cap," Ms Saffioti said

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New Midland private hospital project

ST John of God Health Care is set to deliver a brand new standalone private hospital in Midland, the first of its kind for Perth's eastern suburbs and the wider Wheatbelt region which will more than double private bed capacity in Midland and surrounding areas.

Planning for the project is well underway, with the facility to be located at a site already earmarked for development of a private hospital, about 300m from the current St John of God Midland Public and Private Hospitals

The hospital will provide a full-service standalone private hospital experience, offering comprehensive medical and surgical services, some of which will be offered for the first time in the region.

The new 17,000sqm facility will include 96 overnight inpatient beds including a sixbed critical care/high dependency unit, 24 bed (plus six chairs) short stay and day procedure unit, four general theatres, two procedure rooms and a cardiac/vascular catheter laboratory.

St John of God Health Care Group chief executive officer Bryan Pyne said the project demonstrates the organisation's commitment to boosting hospital, allied health and community services for an ever-increasing population.

"In addition to continuing to deliver pub-

lic services in the soon-to-be-expanded St John of God Midland Public Hospital, the new private hospital will offer greater choice for the community at their doorstep, with a wide range of medical and surgical services including interventional cardiology," he said.

"In particular, interventional cardiology services will be a first for the region, meaning many patients with heart diseases will no longer be required to travel long distances to receive care at a tertiary hospital

"We are committed to continuing to provide the highest standard of private health care services in a contemporary facility to meet the future needs of private patients. The new private hospital will, in effect, more than double private bed capacity in Midland and the surrounding area.

"The project will be delivered swiftly, to meet the existing high demand for private hospital services at Midland and minimise the gap in the provision of these services when the current private hospital facilities cease operation in 2026."

Subject to relevant approvals, commencement of site works is scheduled to begin in

Residents seek to extend heritage

THE Town of Bassendean has voted to proceed with its amended heritage planning including the designation of the proposed Earlsferry heritage area while also requesting a report on the **Nurstead Avenue precinct.**

This came about after some town residents asked for Nurstead Avenue to be included in the heritage

At the December council meeting Jean Anning of Nurstead Avenue made a statement to the council about the submissions to include Nurstead Avenue and 8 Thompson Road in the proposed Earlsferry heritage area.

The minutes said she described the historical context around the four properties listed on the town's heritage survey and was unsure why other properties of the same era had not been included on the heritage survey.

Fifty per cent of Nurstead Avenue responded to the consultation with almost unanimous support for Nurstead Avenue to be included in the heritage precinct.

Nurstead Avenue resident Katharina Wolf told Echo News the Nurstead area was of unique value as residents had preserved the original cluster of early 1900s federation homes, maintaining their street appeal and key architectural features.

This area compliments Earslferry House – indeed I'd argue that the historical value of the category 1 listed Earlsferry House and guided bridge sites are contextualised by the cluster of houses in Nurstead Avenue," she said.

"At a time where new estates pop up right left and centre, I believe it's crucial that we recognise the detail and planning that has gone into these early settlements.

West Guildford was originally marketed as a weekend escape location from the city - similar to the likes of Dalkeith.

"The fact that the Success Hill railway station

was established in the first place speaks to the social role of this area, which is much older than what is today known as Bassendean.

"So yes, I would encourage every single resident to value, protect and celebrate their local history and to embrace any measures to protect historical landmarks into the future.


'This particular area is loved by locals - not just the actual residents of Nurstead Avenue.

"It's on the town's heritage trail and sought out by many (dog) walkers.

"There is a special feel about this little pocket of Bassendean.'

But Martin Jaine from Earlsferry House told the council they had not had anyone come and see them about the heritage proposal.

"We are already on the heritage listing and the houses at the front aren't of a heritage precinct so we can't build anything, so I'm not really sure what this heritage thing is all about," he said.

THE City of Swan remains open to discussion on the future of the Midland farmers' markets as licensing and insurance issues have brought the markets to a halt.

The markets ran in the City of Swan and Landgate carpark before a Facebook post in June 2023 by Midland Farmers Market stated that "the markets will be closed until further notice due to a leasing issue with the shire.'

An update post in December by Midland Farmers Market then stated that the markets will be closed permanently due to being "a problem for the shire."

City of Swan Mayor Tanya Richardson said that after the previous licensee who was authorised to run markets gave up the lease, two stallholders kept the markets going for a while.

"However, they were not incorporated or insured and did not have a license to operate the markets, she said.

"This presented considerable risk for the stall-

"The city met with the stallholders last year to explain the situation and reiterated that the city wanted the markets to continue if possible.

Ms Richardson said the city offered to help them to become incorporated, and proposed an auspicing arrangement and a temporary license while the process was worked through.

"The stallholders stopped running the markets while they considered their options," she said.

"The city remains open to discussion about the future of the markets.



"These outstanding firefighters don't seek accolades, but it's heartening to see them recognised nationally for decades of loyal service to their community."






Granny flat exemptions give housing boost

THE state government has introduced relaxed amendments to residential design codes (R-Codes) aimed at boosting housing supply through removing the minimum lot size requirements for granny flats.

Compliant granny flats on residential lots of any size in Western Australia will no longer require approval under the latest state planning reform initiative to help boost housing supply.

Previously size of 350sqm was required for an ancillary dwelling or granny flat. However, where a granny flat meets the deemed to comply provisions of the codes it may be exempt from development approval.

Any granny flat will need to meet setback requirements and must not exceed 70m2.

In addition to the removal of the minimum lot size, changes in most cases mean an ancillary dwelling will not be required to provide a parking bay, except for ancillary dwellings in some densities and proposed in locations where a car is more likely to be needed due to distance fr lic transport.

The changes made in relation to parking have been designed to allow for greater flexibility when considering parking requirements

and reduce the extent of covered parking on-site, thereby opening up more of the lot for either dwelling space or garden space.

These reforms build on previous initiatives that removed the need for planning approval for some change-of-use applications and small residential projects such as pergolas and decks.

The amended state planningpolicy 7.3 will be released in mid-March 2024 and will become operational by mid-April 2024

Property investor collapses

A DEVELOPER with partly-built apartments on Scaddan Street hit with a demolition order by the Town of Bassendean has gone into liquidation.

In its website promotion to potential investors FTD Construction – also known as Fulfil The Dream – said the eight apartments it was building on Scaddan Street would be worth \$3.8 million once completed.

Last year in September the building services board refused to renew the company's building contractor registration as the board was not satisfied that the company met financial, management and supervision requirements for registration.

As reported in *Unfinished Bassendean apartments* to go (*Echo News*, January 19) the Town of Bassendean has issued a demolition order saying it was concerned with the development.

The town said it could not provide any more information as the demolition order was subject to an appeal with the State Administrative Tribunal.

Then on Tuesday, January 30 an Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) announcement said at a general meeting of the mem-

bers of the company held on January 29, it was resolved that the company be wound up and that Mathieu Tribut be appointed liquidator.

This prompted Building and Energy to recommend that property owners affected by the liquidation of FTD Construction to contact their home indemnity insurance (HII) provider, QBE Insurance, if they have not already done so.

Building and Energy acting executive director Peter Stewart said homeowners with incomplete or defective building work by FTD Construction should contact QBE on 1300 790 723 to discuss their HII policy.

"Home indemnity insurance provides financial protection for homeowners if their builder faces circumstances such as insolvency or loss of their builder registration," he said.

"Contacting the insurance provider enables homeowners to begin the process of engaging another registered builder to complete the work or managing other remedies they may be entitled to."

Mr Stewart said subcontractors affected by the insolvency should contact Mathieu Tribut of GTS Advisory, who has been appointed liquidator, on info@gtsadvisory.com.au or 9223 7900.

Wheatbelt battery project planned

THE Shire of Merredin has backed a proposed \$220 million battery development that could help improve power reliability in the Wheatbelt and Goldfields.

Nomad Energy and Sydney-based Atmos Renewables are planning a 400-megawatt-hour battery project in Merredin.

Only recently, storms knocked out electricity for thousands of customers throughout the Perth Hills, Wheatbelt and Goldfields, made worse when Kalgoorlie's gas-fired turbine backup failed to restart

The planned battery would boost grid reliability and have the capacity to support restart during a blackout.

The Central Wheatbelt location will mean the battery can firm up supply in the eastern section of the network, including Kalgoorlie.

A final investment decision is targeted in the second half of the year.

The 400-megawatt-hour battery project will have about twice as much storage capacity as Tesla's Hornsdale Reserve system in South Australia.

Swan meeting of electors on Monday

THE City of Swan annual meeting of electors will be held at Ballajura Community College on Monday, February 5, starting at 6pm and concluding at the latest by 9pm.

Last year electors put forward 43 motions with the city's responses available on its website – most of the city's comments also included that no further report was required.

Patrick Irwin of Woodbridge put forward a motion that the whole of greater Midland area traffic planning by Main Roads WA and Transperth be obtained and made available to the council and the public.

The city said the matter had been dealt with as part of a notice of motion from Midland Guildford councillor Sarah Howlett on May 4, 2022.

"The city has written to the state government and requested a copy of the "Jacobs 2021 Traffic Report", which will be reported back to the council when it is received," the city said.

A motion put forward by Kerry Rowe from the Upper Swan District Ratepayers and Residents Association requested that contact details of the operations/quarry manager be displayed on front gates of all extraction sites within the City of Swan, especial-

ly Upper Swan and surrounds.

The city said it was currently reviewing the existing local planning policy pertaining to extractive operations and has received responses from stakeholders to a scoping questionnaire on issues associated with extractive activities.

"Site management obligations by proponents will be addressed as part of a new draft policy to be provided for public comment in 2024," the city said.

Woodbridge resident Francesca Irwin put up a motion that the city apply for Lottery West Funding to create history walks plaques for Midland.

"The city is currently reviewing its local heritage survey with stage 1 being properties in Midland," the city said.

"This needs to be undertaken prior to any walk trail marking being identified to ensure the correct information and subsequent costs being identified."

Former councillor Claire Scanlan of Guildford's motion was that the council provide a safe pedestrian crossing on James Street near Attfield Street in Guildford to enable access to East Guildford train station and local schools.

"It is within the city's 10-year plan to construct this crossing as part of the cycle strategy," the city

The senior male sides faced Perth in their latest two day fixture


