A tribute to Barry Rhodes - an end of an era

THE recent death of 83 year-old Barry Rhodes at his home in Mundaring has brought an end to an era in Western Australian forestry.

Barry spent his entire working life at Mundaring Weir, working for the Forests Department and then the Conservation and Land Management Department. He was the son of

Watty Rhodes (a former woodcutter for the pumps, later the famous and long-serving forestry storeman), and Jessie Rhodes (for more than 40 years the matriarch of the forestry settlement at the Weir).

Barry went to school in the one-teacher school for forestry and PWD kids at Mundaring Weir, left at age 14 and got his first job with the Forests Department as a stable boy. He then did an apprenticeship at the forestry workshops, but did not go on to become a mechanic, as he wanted to work in the bush.

He joined one of the forestry gangs, and then moved to a pine logging crew driving a jib crane. When

the daywork pine gangs were replaced by pieceworkers, Barry was one of the first to switch to the new job, and he was a master of the trade. He knew the plantations, the pines, and the log specifications, he could fall trees, and snig, cut and load logs, he could operate a chainsaw, a log truck and a jib crane, and fix them when they needed fixing. It wasn't long before he was single-handedly doing the work of a whole gang.

At the same time, like all the pine logging pieceworkers, Barry was part of the department's fire control system, and was one of the best heavy duty fire truck drivers in the business. He was a firefighter at the time of the 1961 fires, WA's worst-ever bushfire summer. People still talk about the Dwellingup fire, but forget the massive fires out in the Dale and the Canning and later at Gidgegannup in the same summer.

Those were the days when a forestry gang went to a fire, slept under the truck in the bush, ate tinned food, and did not come home for four days. When they did come home they were immediately sent to another fire.

Barry and his wife Betty lived in one of the forestry houses in the settlement at Portagabra for more than 30 years and in all that time he did

his weekend standby and nighttime call-outs with the rest of them, every summer.

When old Watty retired, Barry applied for and was appointed the department's district storeman, a job he could do with one hand tied behind his back, as he knew the whole business frontwards, backwards and sideways. Under his management the district store was always immaculate, everything exactly in the right place, and every piece of equipment or material clean and dusted. Barry's mother Jessie

Review of JDAP decision sought in Supreme Court

A NEW association formed by businesses and residents has applied to the Supreme Court of WA for a judicial review of the decision to approve redevelopment of the old Guildford vaudeville theatre.

Friends of Guildford Historical Precinct was formed after about 60 people attended a meeting at the Midland town hall, including attendees who had made submissions opposing the development application for Lot 2 & 67 (No.163) and Lot 18 (No.159) James Street.

The meeting was attended by newly elected Mayor Tanya Richardson along with Midland Guildford ward councillor Ian Johnson and Swan Valley Gidgegannup councillor Rod Henderson.

Lodged on November 3 last year the application said the grounds for the review included that in granting approval the Metro Outer joint development assessment panel (JDAP) erred by failing to require any onsite parking to be provided, contrary to the requirement of regulations, and failed to consider the adequacy of parking required by regulation.

Also the application said the JDAP erred by failing to consider that the applicant made reasonable effort to comply with minimum on-site parking and also failed to require payment in lieu of parking or shared parking both required by regulation.

Another ground for the application said that the JDAP erred in the exercise of any discretion and failed to have regarded submissions made as required by the City of Swan town planning scheme.

The first respondent named in the application for judicial review is the JDAP presiding member, with Hawthorn Brewing Company the first other respondent party and Castle Towers and Fanucci the second other respondent party.

When JDAP considered the proposal on September 26 last year it included comments from the city's design review panel and State Her-

'The proposed design is an exemplary outcome that breathes new life into a heritage building in a restrained and sensitive manner and will help to activate Guildford's historic main street," the city's design review panel said.

"The proposed development will have an overall positive impact on the registered places and on the James Street streetscape," State Heritage said.

But at the JDAP meeting Barbara Dundas from the Guildford Association raised community concerns about the linking of the development application to the Guildford Hotel, with particular reference to parking issues in the area and that resident concerns had largely been ignored in the responsible authority report (RAR) prepared by the city.

In relation to traffic, parking and access the RAR concluded city staff were prepared to consider the appli-

cation, which encompassed both the existing hotel and the former vaudeville theatre on the basis it entailed no increase in traffic generation or parking demand subject to imposition of a condition on the planning approval that limited the total number of patrons within both premises at any one time to no more than 729 persons.

A transport impact statement prepared for Urbis said to encourage other modes of transport and the proponent had previously partnered with rideshare providers to offer discounts to their patrons for adopting rideshare as their means of transport to the venue.

"The parking survey has shown that there is sufficient available offsite parking spaces to accommodate the proposed redevelopment," the statement said.

"The location of the site has also

made it viable for employees and patrons to be encouraged to use alternative modes of transport, such as public transport, walking and cy-

cling.
"The site is currently located within walking distance of the train station and a bus stop located rear of

Update on 'Safer Midland' initiative

MIDLAND Police officer-in-charge senior sergeant Mark Marriot has invited business and community members to attend a public meeting for an update on the 'Safer Midland' initiative on Wednesday, February 14 commencing at 9am at the Crooked Spire Coffee and Arthouse.

Sgt Marriot will talk about the initiative's progress, focussed on Midland's CBD, and how data is helping the fight against crime.

The initiative was launched last year and as last reported ('Safer Midland; initiative helps fight against crime, Echo News 22/9/2023) more than 100 businesses had already signed up to a WhatsApp group in the fight against crime in the Midland CBD by collating live data on a daily basis which is available to police and security, along with providing vital evidence for criminal prosecution.

The initiative has grown from its initial beginnings at Centrepoint Shopping Centre to stem retail theft to now cover the entire Midland CBD with support from businesses and professionals working in the area.

Coordinated by the Swan Chamber of Com-

merce, chief executive officer Tom Smilovitis said it was an opportunity to connect with WAPOL and neighbouring business owners and professionals.

Recent operations have focussed on anti-social hehaviour and retail offences to stem these types of crimes, with police reaching out to retailers for their take on crime, and conducting walk-throughs in the CBD.

Mr Smilovitis said local high school students had also been involved, and the message was clear "if you see something report it and let the police do the policing.

He said over the last couple of years Midland



Swan vape seller restrictions on the cards

FOLLOWING in the footsteps of the City of Bayswater, the City of Swan is looking to amend its local planning scheme to re-classify businesses which sell vapes as a 'restricted premises.

City of Swan Mayor Tanya Richardson said the city's current Local Planning Scheme does not differentiate businesses selling vapes, tobacco or other smoking related implements, but it is working towards a new planning scheme which could change this.

"Under the new local planning scheme, any business selling smoking implements would be classified as a 'restricted premises', limited to commercial areas and subject to council approval after public advertising," she said.

Updating planning schemes to restrict stores from selling vapes, tobacco or other smoking related paraphernalia within certain parts of the council is not a new phenomenon, with the City of Bayswater updating its town planning policy to restrict the sellers in 2023.

The move comes after a study by the University of Notre Dame Australia, which was commissioned by the Cancer Council WA, found that almost 90

per cent of e-cigarette or vape stores within the state were within 1km of a school – with the study identifying that lower socio-economic areas were more likely to house the stores.

The study discounted convenience stores and supermarkets which sold vapes, and instead focused on brick-and-mortar stores selling vapes as a main source of business, alongside smoke shops and tobacconists.

Of the 194 stores the study identified, 88 per cent were located within a short walk to either a primary or high school.

Mandurah topped the study's list, with seven operating in the suburb. Midland was tied second with Cannington, Perth,

and Rockingham, with the study identifying six shops within the suburbs. Notre Dame research fellow Dr Matthew Tuson,


the study's lead author, said there is a lot of concern amongst the community, particularly by parents and teachers, about the current youth vaping

"We know from overseas studies that the tobacco industry often sets up shop in disadvantaged areas where they can prey on vulnerable populations, and cont. page 12.



This English oak tree was 154-years-old.

If age is a measure of importance, as the article implies, why is it that so few of our native gum trees (Jarrah, Marri, Wandoo, Yarri, Moitj) are heritage listed when so many are two, three, and four centuries old?

Even when deemed important and named as habitat trees – because a single water-wise one of these green infrastructural assets can house dozens of birds, mammals, reptiles, tens of thousands of invertebrates, and breathe and offer free air-conditioning for countless humans – why are such trees not given full protection against greed and senselessness?

Why isn't there a community outburst each time one is felled to make way for progress, or to improve community safety?

The oak was 'taken' under natural circumstances

By contrast, humans have deliberately cut down dozens of ancient gums in the last few years alone.

The iconic Marfronting Lake Leschenaultia's main beach, felled in early 2023 when aged about 230, is but one example.

I missed the funeral notice for that one.

East Metropolitan champion to hang up her boots



East Metropolitan MLC Donna Faragher tells Echo News one of her proudest moments was advocating for a new Governor Stirling SHS when in Opposition.

AN East Metropolitan MLC who has always advocated for the area she was born at Swan District Hospital - is set to step away from politics in May 2025.

On a local Donna Faragher counts working successfully with the school community to put the pressure on for a rebuild of Governor Stirling Senior High School as one of her proudest achievements.

She was approached during her first term of Opposition by parents who went to her as a new member.

They told her the school was just not good enough for the students and teachers to learn in.

"I agreed and so with them I worked closely by advocating for them both inside parliament and outside of it until such time as a decision was made for that school to be rebuilt," she said.

"I'm enormously proud to have played a part in what is now a magnificent school in the heart of our elec-

She is also proud to have supported the Woodlupine Family Centre in Forrestfield when they thought that they would close.

"Obviously as a minister you get to do broader issues, you are able to put forward policies and ensure they are implemented."

When she was younger her plan was to become a teacher and a school psychologist but after working for former WA senator and federal minister Chris Ellison while studying for her masters of education an opportunity arose to put her name forward for preselection.

She was selected when she was 28-years-old and then became a member of Parliament at the age of 29 and was instrumental in establishing the office of Environmental Protection

"I've had the opportunity both to be a local member for a significant period of time, been a minister in government twice, an Environment and Youth minister then Planning and Disability Services minister.

It was a big challenge coming in as Environment minister and Youth in the first term of the Barnett government.

"I had just turned 33 – the youngest female minister in the state's history and they were really important port-

"The Environment can be a really contentious portfolio but I loved that portfolio - there's different parts to it - there's your conservation side and then you've got your regulatory environmental approval side and as I say it can be contentious.

"But I relished that and to this day some of the most important areas that I've made a contribution in in those couple of years as Environment min-

She cited her advocacy for Governor Stirling SHS as an example of her belief that you can also do really good things in Opposition as well.

"You don't just need to be a minister or in government to do good and in that first term that I was Disability Services I put forward a very comprehensive policy that was ultimately delivered by our government and I'm enormously proud of that policy I de-

"It was a real honour for me in our final term of government to be appointed Disability Services minister and it is an area that I continue to have a really strong interest in and will advocate for and as an example of where I will continue to work particularly in the area of early childhood development through my role as shadow minister for community services and early childhood.

"It's a particular focus of mine and still on my-to-do list to ensure that we get the proper funding for child development services in this state.

"I will not rest until such time as we do get proper funding for a service that children need in this state and that they are waiting too long to access right now." After she leaves Parliament she is going to take some time to decide her next move.

'But community is really important so I wouldn't be surprised if you continue to see me working in the community services and early childhood space because they are areas I am particularly passionate about and where I think we can do good things.

She said as a member of the Opposition in the past few years she had sought to bring attention to the needs of children in WA in terms of a range of issues but particularly in relation to access to services whether it's paediatric services, speech pathology or other allied health services.

AFTER seven years at the helm of the lower house seat of Kalamunda for Labor, Matthew Hughes has announced he is not seeking re-election in 2025.

Elected to the seat in 2017, Mr Hughes defeated Liberal MLA John Day with 52.5 per cent of the votes to Mr Day's 47.5 per cent.

In 2021, Mr Hughes was re-elected amongst the Labor landslide with 62 per cent of the vote, attributing his success to his accessibility among

"I have given it a good go since 2017. I have bought the needs of the district squarely in front of the government with sound outcomes," he said.

"It has been a privilege to represent the people of the district and to be their voice in the state gov-

Mr Hughes counts among his achievements protecting the Kalamunda Railway Heritage Trail, getting pedestrian crossings for Great Eastern Highway in Mundaring, building replacement buildings at Lesmurdie Primary School, the construction of the Jorgensen Park Community Centre, and major investments in John Forrest National Park improvements.

But it wasn't a career without controversy, with Mr Hughes making headlines in 2021 over accusations of bullying from his staffers and from when he was principal of John Septimus Roe Anglican Community School.

Controversy also erupted in 2020 when Mr Hughes revealed information on Facebook which detailed two of the four members of the Parliament Joint Standing Committee on the Corruption and Crime Commission did not support the re-appointment of then commissioner John McKech-

This led to calls that Mr Hughes should resign by former WA Liberal leader Liza Harvey and Liberal south metropolitan region MLC Nick Goiran.

Mr Hughes denied the bullying allegations and said he has no regrets from his time in politics, and that he also has no plans for his retirement either.

"My wife and I have six adult children and 10 grandchildren and I am looking forward to spending more time with them,

On a potential replacement, Mr Hughes said he did not know who it could be.

'There is a Labor party pre-selection process that will begin shortly," he said.

"My hope and wish is that a local candidate emerges with a strong and long-standing connection to the hills."

Premier Roger Cook called Mr Hughes a fantastic advocate for the community.

"Matthew's been an important part of our Labor team since 2017, and his contribution will be missed – but he can be proud of the legacy he leaves," he said.

Charges dropped over Wooroloo fire

LAST week the man accused of starting the 2021 Wooroloo bushfires had all charges dropped just days before he was due stand tri-

Daniel Gunter Preuss was set to begin trial this week, but on Thursday, February 1, three years to the day the fire began, prosecutors dropped the charges against him.

Public prosecutor Tracy Tan told the court the charges against the 42-year-old were being discontinued because there were no reasonable prospects of a conviction.


On July 16, 2021, Mr Preuss was arrested and charged with starting the fire with an angle grinder he was using to remove a padlock from a sea container on his property.

Since he was charged, Mr Preuss has denied the accusation of failing to reasonably ensure that an ignition source would not cause a fire that could not be controlled.

The Wooroloo bushfire started on February 1, 2021, near Werribee Road, during a total fire ban and a five-day COVID lockdown.

Weather conditions on the day only contributed to the devastation with a daytime temperature of 38 degrees and strong winds causing the fire to spread rapidly.

The fire raged until February 7, destroyed 86 homes, burnt through close to 11,000ha of land, and cost insurers almost \$100 million.

Cameras roll in Darlington

FILMING has commenced in a Darlington home of yet another screen production in the Perth Hills following recent filming in Gidgegannup for Runt, largely filmed in York.

The Darlington home is being used for Zoe Pepper's debut feature film, Birthright, which kicked off production last week with an impressive ensemble cast.

The dark comedy stars Travis Jeffery (Kingdom of the Planet of the Apes, Unbroken, Gallipoli) and Maria Angelico (The Newsreader, Strife, Sisters) as Cory and Jasmine, a professional couple in their 30s who are eight months pregnant.

When Cory loses his job, they are forced to move back in with his retiree parents played by Linda Cropper (Offspring, Upgrade) and Michael Hurst (Hercules, Spartacus), until they get back on their feet. As their stay extends, Cory fixates on his parents' wealth and decides the only way to achieve the success he always imagined, is to do something

Set in a single location, filming will continue over the next four weeks, and will include an allstar lineup of Western Australian crew including director of photography Michael McDermott ACS (Hounds of Love), production designer Ocea Sellar (Mystic Pines) and costume designer Texx Montana (He Ain't Heavy).

Director Zoe Pepper said she was incredibly grateful to have such a talented team backing her vision and working so hard to bring this story to

"The cast and crew are doing an amazing job. It's quite surreal to see this world I've concocted come to life. I'm equal parts terrified and excited to kick off filming.

Birthright was the 2022 recipient of Screenwest's highly coveted West Coast Visions initiative, which is designed to uncover, inspire and develop talented and motivated WA filmmakers with distinctive visions to produce their debut feature film in WA.

Through this initiative, Birthright secured \$750,000 production funding from Screenwest and went on to secure Screen Australia production funding and Madman Entertainment as ANZ distributor.

Screenwest chief executive officer Rikki Lea Bestall said kicking off 2024 with a West Coast Visions film heading into production was a great start to what is already shaping up to be a bumper year.

Seeing Birthright come to life is very exciting and Screenwest is so pleased to be supporting Zoe in her debut. A quintessentially Australian story about boomers versus millennials - I can't wait."

Filming is scheduled to wrap on March 1, 2024, and is the first major production to begin filming in WA this year, but will soon be joined by a new feature from WA director Zak Hilditch, featuring Daisy Ridley of Star Wars fame.

It continues a record period of screen production in the state, which last year included Sam Neill's arrival for Season 2 of The Twelve, largely filmed in York, along with Runt, and Nicolas Cage's film The Surfer shot in the south west.

Call for Swan boundary changes

A SOUTH Guildford resident has raised the idea of older established suburbs in the City of Swan undergoing a boundary change, which would result in them becoming part of the Town of Bassendean.

Marilena Stimfl has put forward a successful motion asking the city to engage with the town on whether there was any receptiveness for the two local governments to develop a joint proposal at the City of Swan's annual electors meeting on February 5.

On Wednesday she told Echo News the motion was put together after talking to residents in older established suburbs such as Guildford, Woodbridge, Midland, Kiara and Lockridge who had different expectations and problems to those residing in new suburbs.

She has also spoken to community groups and the local governments of Bassendean and Mundaring

In a statement supporting her motion she said the City of Swan had a population of more than 165,000 and 42 suburbs.

"There is no doubt that as the largest met-

ropolitan local government area with some of the fastest growing suburbs in WA, that such high growth poses challenges for this council to meet the needs and expectations of rapidly expanding urban areas, for example Ellenbrook and Brabham, verses established communities such as Guildford and Woodbridge for example," the statement said.

"Extreme diversity in demographics and the variable needs of old verses new suburbs often leads to disparity in revenue distribu-

She said currently the Town of Bassendean had seven elected representatives, which was two less than the maximum permitted under recent local government reforms.

'Augmenting the overall population of the town via ministerial approval of a boundary change would likely be the catalyst to increase the number of elected representatives to nine (at least) for the Town of Bassendean, whilst the City of Swan could retain their existing number of elected representatives.

This would facilitate broader and more targeted representation for the populations of both these local authorities."



New guidelines call for three week benching for concussion

ATHLETES who suffer a concussion are now recommended to spend 21 days away from sport under new concussion guidelines released by the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS).

Released at the start of February, the AIS 'Australian concussion guidelines for youth and community sport' stress the importance of giving concussed athletes time to recover.

The guidelines state that returning to work or school should take priority over a return to sport, and that contact sport should only be resumed after a minimum period of 21 days.

An athlete should only return to training after 14 days of being symptom free of concussion, according to the guidelines

'That is not 14 days from the time of concussion. It is 14 days from when the athlete becomes symptom-free,' the guidelines state.

Subtle signs and symptoms of a

concussion include nausea, confusion or disorientation, fatigue, memory impairment, light and noise sensitivity, headaches or a feeling of pressure in the head, difficulties in concentrating, paleness, dazed or blank stares and even behaviour or emotional changes.

Severe signs of a concussion include repeated vomiting, loss of consciousness, seizures or convulsions, a deteriorating conscious state, loss of vision, neck pain, visible deformities to the skull and a severe or increasing

If severe signs are present the guidelines state the concussed athlete should be taken to the emergency department immediately.

For suspected concussions, an immediate removal from sport is recommended with no return to play for that day and that the concussed athlete be referred to a healthcare practitioner as soon as possible.

Curtin University health science research fellow Dr Sarah Hellewell said a common myth around concussion is that you have to be knocked out to get a one.

"The symptoms can be really varied and look different for everyone, so someone who doesn't have the typical symptoms of dizziness, confusion or vomiting may also be concussed," she

"You don't necessarily have to hit your head – a strike to the body like a hard tackle may be enough to cause damage to the brain... this is a brain injury that needs to be treated carefully like we would any other bodily injury.

AIS chief medical officer Dr David Hughes said all instances of concussion should be treated with caution - especially for those aged under 19 who still have developing brains.

"The AIS wants everyone involved in sport to remember, when considering an athlete with possible concussion, 'if in doubt, sit them out'," he

Swan Valley heat record

THE Swan Valley last week sweltered through its hottest day on record, with the temperature hitting a searing 45C in the midst of Perth's second severe heatwave for 2024.

A top of 45.2C was recorded at Pearce air base just after midday on Thursday, February 1 with the Swan Valley being the second hottest area of Perth and surrounds, reaching 44.6C and eclipsing its previous record of 44.5C, recorded in February 2022

Synergy asked customers to turn off unused appliances and set air-conditioners to 24C while Transperth slowed trains by

up to 30km/h to stop heat warping the tracks.

When temperatures hit 41C all Transperth trains are required to reduce their speed by 30km per hour, while a 20km per hour reduction kicks in on the Midland line at 37C.

The heatwave looks set to continue this week, after a respite on the weekend, with temperatures again expected to rise again on Thursday with the UV index remaining extreme.

At this stage forecasts predict 39C on Thursday, and 41C on Friday and Saturday, before dropping to 35C on Monday.



Extra funding available to boost WA e-waste projects

THE state government has made up to \$3.5 mil-nesses to purchase and install any relevant equiplion of grants available to support Western Ausment. tralia's electrical and electronic waste collection and recycling network as a ban on e-waste disposal to landfill is set to come into effect later this

E-waste, or waste electrical and electronic equipment, includes items with a plug, battery or cord that are no longer working or wanted.

WA's e-waste ban will be introduced later this year, and includes most electronic consumer goods, such as large household appliances, mobile phones, televisions, and computers.

Grants are available for projects which either support facilities to collect, manage and store e-waste, before reuse or onward reprocessing, or focus on reprocessing and recycling, including assisting busi-

Environment Minister Reece Whitby said e-waste was a rapidly growing stream of waste, and addi tional funding will create jobs as well as increase reuse and recycling pathways for waste electrical and electronic items.

"This is an important step in moving our State closer to its goal of a circular economy, and I look forward to seeing these projects delivered and in operation ahead of Western Australia's e-waste to landfill ban later this year."

Grants are open to businesses, local governments and regional councils, and registered charities.



WHILE the future of the Kookaburra Outdoor Cinema remains up in the air, its owner Peter Foyster says he can't believe the outpouring of support he's received.

The hills cinema, located on Allen Road in Mundaring, was hit hard by last month's storm, as reported in Kookaburra Cinema future uncertain after storm (Echo News, January 26).

Mr Foyster said he began receiving vocal support and offers to help almost immediately after the storm, but had to wait until the damage was fully assessed before he could accept.

On Tuesday, February 6, he posted a callout to the businesses' Facebook page asking for anyone who could volunteer their time or services to reach out.

The provisional insurance assessment had provided a quote for repairs that considerably exceeded the amount the cinema is insured for.

'Just the screen and the scaffolding required for repairs was quoted at around \$36,000. Originally, we'd estimated to repair the screen for \$20,000 and even then, we were hoping to get it done for less,' Mr Foyster said.

In less than 24 hours the FaceBook post had accumulated more than 150 reactions, 100 comments, and 120 shares.

Mr Foyster said he was surprised at the overwhelming support the cinema had received in such a short period of time.

"I want them to know that I'm really very touched by their words and their offers, and it certainly has changed my mind because I can see how much it's valued," he said.

"Any thoughts of maybe just walking away have all but disappeared because I owe it to the commu-

nity to get it back up and running."
But his main concern is safety. The focus is to repair the structural supports of the screen first, as the central weight bearing strut was torn from the back of the screen during the storm, the lack of which increases the risk of danger.

"I need to be clear that I can't have people just coming in because of the safety issues, it could still be dangerous," he said.

Mr Foyster, 75, had originally intended for this to be his last season as the proprietor of the hill's

"All the hard work and maintenance is just too much for me, I don't really have much choice but to retire from it, but before I do I need to ensure that I find it a good owner."

However, he added, he would like to stay on in some capacity to help with the transition of any new

Perth Hills climate group call to defer climate change Bill

PERTH Hills Climate Change Interest Group (PHCCIG) has supported the call by key climate-concerned organisations to urgently refer WA's pending Climate Change Bill 2023 to a Parliamentary committee to allow independent expert advice and informed community debate.

"The Bill, soon to be tabled in Parliament, is a welcome step in the right direction to secure a safer climate, but insufficient time has been allowed to consult with community or energy experts,' PHCCIG chair Lynda Winter said.

Unlike legislation in other states, the WA Climate Change Bill does not include a target for a reduction in emissions by 2030.

"It also does not allow for the establishment of an independent climate advisory body to effectively advise, monitor, and measure the impact of climate action or inaction," she said.

We are concerned that the Bill as it stands allows carbon pollution in WA to continue to rise and can put at risk Australia's commitment to a 43 per cent emissions reduction by 2030.

"The heatwaves just in the last week, and the damage and loss of power experienced by thousands of Perth Hills households following an extraordinary storm, brings the effects of climate change right to our doorsteps, and we need urgent and effective climate action now.

Hills residents are encouraged to talk or write to their local representatives and ask for a strong and effective climate change Bill that will protect hills people and the environment now and into the

Toll charged over forklift injury

WORKSAFE has charged Toll Transport after a forklift incident at their Perth Airport premises left a worker with serious and permanent injuries to their legs.

The incident occurred in January 2021 when a worker was tasked with placing stickers on the floor to delineate bays for deliveries to different mine sites.

Worksafe alleges that while the worker was performing their duties, a forklift reversed into them and drove over their left foot and right leg.

Worksafe contends that Toll did not implement practical measures to keep employees safe, leading to a charge of failing to provide and maintain safe workplace and, by that failure, causing harm to an employee.

Toll was also charged with failing to ensure that movement and speed of vehicles and plant at the



workplace were managed in a way that minimised risk to pedestrians.

If convicted, Toll faces up to \$2 million in fines. The case's first mention will take place on February 16 at Perth Magistrates Court.





Asbestos warning for renovators

WITH many properties changing hands in recent years the national Asbestos Education Committee has issued a warning to people who might risk disturbing asbestos when renovating older homes.

With the annual death toll from asbestos-related diseases exceeding 4000 and predicted to rise, it's vital that every Australian homeowner understands where asbestos might be lurking in their home and what to do to manage it safely.

What most don't know is that asbestos could be anywhere in any home built before 1990 including brick, fibro, weatherboard, clad homes, apartments or sheds because it was used in the manufacture of more than 3000 building and decorator products, not just fibro sheeting.

Asbestos could be lurking under floor coverings including carpets, linoleum and vinyl tiles, behind wall and floor tiles, in cement floors, internal and external walls, ceilings and ceiling space (insulation), eaves, roofs, around hot water pipes, fences, home extensions, garages, outdoor toilets, backyard and farm structures, chook sheds and even dog kennels.

The fear is that with the popularity of renovating continuing to soar, if property owners aren't aware that po-

tentially deadly asbestos lurks within one in three homes, and if asbestos is disturbed during renovation, demolition or maintenance, homeowners could be risking their lives and the lives of their loved ones.

The first rule is, if you think a product may contain asbestos, treat it as if it is asbestos and take all the necessary precautions starting with having the property inspected by an occupational hy-



gienist or a licenced asbestos assessor.

Remember, a regular building inspection does not test for asbestos! And if asbestos is confirmed, property owners should only use licenced asbestos removalists to ensure they protect themselves and their families.

Vines paver pays for taking money without doing work

A VINES paver who took more than \$2500 from a customer and failed to undertake any work has been ordered to refund the money and pay a further \$5,000 in fines and costs, following a prosecution by Consumer Protection.

Massimo Marcello Mario Douchamps, trading as M Renovations, pleaded guilty in the Perth Magistrates Court to breaching the Australian Consumer Law when he received a \$2,535 deposit from a customer in The Vines in November 2020 and did not deliver the goods and services.

The customer was quoted \$5,070 by Mr Douchamps to supply and install pavers in the back garden and for a side gate to be fitted. But after taking the 50 per cent deposit and agreeing to undertake the work within the next few weeks,

Mr Douchamps stopped responding to the customer's messages and never returned.

Mr Douchamps was ordered by the court to compensate the customer for the deposit, along with a \$4000 fine and costs of \$1000, with Magistrate Heath commenting on the need to enforce provisions of this kind that are designed to protect consumers.

Commissioner for Consumer Protection Tim Banfield said it was unacceptable for tradespeople to take deposits without completing the work.

"Let this be a warning for other tradespeople – you are breaking the law if you take money from customers and don't undertake the work in a reasonable time, or by the completion date listed on the contract, and we will not hesitate to take action," Mr Banfield said.

"It's also a reminder for consumers about the risks that can come with paying large deposits upfront. That's why we recommend only paying a small amount before work begins or negotiating progress

payments on bigger jobs.

"Paying by credit card can be a good option, as it offers extra protection by allowing consumers to apply for a chargeback if the goods or services are not provided.

"Consumers who have paid a deposit and experienced unreasonable delays in the delivery of goods or services and have failed to resolve the issue with the business are advised to lodge a complaint with Consumer Protection."

around a fire, plotting the position of the hopovers on an old Mundaring 80 map.

Like many forest workmen of his time, Barry loved and was proud of the local forestry history – he had a magnificent collection of old photographs and even some old departmental files that had been destined for the incinerator, but which he kept for their historical interest and later donated to the Mundaring Historical Society. His memory for people and places was phenomenal; he knew every road or track, nearly every tree, in the Mundaring plantations, the Helena catchment and the Julimar.

He helped make an excellent video about forestry at the weir, and he assisted me (and others) many times with historical research. One interesting snippet is that the legendary forester George Brockway initially stopped Barry's first appointment on the grounds that it was not good policy to have a father and son working together as fire-fighters. Luckily, the wonderful old district forester Frank Mullumby did not share Brockway's concern, he knew a likely lad when he saw one, and quietly gave Barry his first job. Fifty years later Barry was instrumental in the recovery and conversion to DVD of Frank Mullumby's fascinating home-made movies about life at the Weir and in the forestry.

Barry Rhodes was the last I knew who had started in forestry straight from school and worked for his entire lifetime for the department and in the same district, moving through the ranks from stable hand to apprentice mechanic to gang member, including a period as an overseer, to pieceworker and to storeman, all the time being also involved in every aspects of bushfire management.

Like the best of the traditional forest workmen, he was a true all-rounder: he could drive anything on wheels or tracks, and probably on hooves for all I knew – certainly I recall his passionate interest in the trots and the gallops – and he could operate anything with an engine. When he sharpened my chainsaw for me, it would cut through cast iron.

He was utterly loyal to his fellow-forest workmen and would die for them if called to do so, and he nearly did, in a bushfire at Chittering.

He was, for many years, one of my staff. But he was always one of my mates.

It is wonderful that the Rhodes legacy at Mundaring Weir lives on into the third generation through his sons, but in many ways his passing is the end of an era. The forestry life that he lived has also passed, and we will not see it, or men like Barry Rhodes again.

we found the same pattern here with vape retailers," he said.

"Previous tobacco research has shown that the proximity of tobacco retailers to schools or homes can influence smoking behaviours, and similar relationships have been reported for e-cigarettes."

On January 1, importing disposable vapes was banned by the federal government, with the importation of all non-therapeutic vapes to be banned from March 1.

"Subject to state or territory law, non-therapeutic vapes imported before March 1, 2024, may still be lawfully sold be retailers generally, including vape stores, provided the vape does not contain nicotine or any other medicine, and does not make therapeutic claims," the new Therapeutic Goods Administration regulations state.

Junior boys in semi-finals for Midland-Guildford

WHILE the Midland-Guildford senior sides were locked in matches, the male U14 and U13 secured their spots in the semi-final stages of the competition.

Entering their match on Sunday, the male U14s were positioned third on the ladder and required a significant victory against Scarborough to move into second position and secure a semi-final berth.

After winning the toss and electing to bowl first, consistent wickets throughout the innings and particularly in the early stages of the match were the key for the side as they limited their opponents to a total of 130 all out.

Having already secured a spot

in the semi-finals, the male U13s were looking to remain unbeaten throughout the regular season phase of the competition and solidify their position atop the ladder.

After electing to bat first, an opening partnership of 44 runs between Tanveer Chauvan (25 off 63) and Lachie Flux (26 off 50) proved to be to the most significant partnership of the innings which finished 5/143 after 40 overs.

It was a dominant all-round bowling performance which followed, with Chauvan collecting three wickets for six runs off four overs


