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

### Midland's Dr Catherine remembered

CATHERINE Van Den Hurk, a longtime Midland GP known to her many patients as Dr Catherine Yap, was a dedicated and respected doctor for more than 50 years.

Born in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in 1944 and the eldest of four children, Dr Catherine pursued her ambitions overseas at the end of her secondary schooling, emigrating to Australia in 1963 to complete high school at MacRobertson Girls' High School in Melbourne.

She studied medicine at Monash University and worked as a doctor up and down the east coast of Australia through to 1972, when she took a job

It was here she met her husband. Bert Van Den Hurk, whom she married the same year.

Later in 1972 her daughter Johanna was born, and Dr Catherine returned to work as a locum, or temporary doctor, for various Perth medical practices three months later.

She continued this work for the next decade, tending patients with any malady they presented

In 1982 Dr Catherine did a few months of locum work at St Andrew's Medical in Midland, where she later became a junior doctor and started working full time.

Three years later she was offered a partnership position at St Andrews and continued

working at the practice until her retirement. St Andrew's was open 24 hours, seven days week, and the surgery's practice manager Kylie Allen said Dr Catherine would often stay the night in the surgery if she was rostered on for

During this time, she was also on call for Swan District Hospital and multiple nursing homes in

As years went by Dr Catherine reduced her workload to part time and retired in June of 2022.

Dr Catherine would go on to work 40 years as a practicing doctor at St Andrews, building a loyal list of patients who would recommend her to

Ms Allen said some families from the clinic had three generations who had all been treated by Dr Catherine.

She was a big part of Midland, being a practicing GP for so many years. She was well-respected and so dedicated to her patients," Ms Allen said.

"She was a well-loved, well-respected person in the community. She'll be greatly missed."

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## Residents want Cale Street noise solutions

Cale Street residents are still pursuing noise mitigation outcomes from PTA engagement and say legal action may be the next step if talks yield no results.

Cale Street crossing uproar (Echo News, July 19) reported the level crossing was opened on July 12, and residents said the noise and light generated by the crossing was disrupting their sleep.

Cale Street resident Aaron Cooper said the PTA hasn't given affirmation residents will receive noise mitigation installations on their properties to date.

The latest is a comment in an email of a meeting after the results are known from the noise assessment that was completed last week," he said.

"There is still no movement regarding light pollution as they are stating this is compliant to the standard.

Mr Cooper hopes to source the results from the completed noise assessments and meet with the PTA or Metronet to discuss remediation for the complex's light and noise issues.

"If there is still no amicable agreement then the next steps will most likely be legal action,"

Residents living in the complex directly across from Cale Street's new level crossing have asked the Public Transport Authority (PTA) for noise mitigation measures since March, as reported in Residents feel overlooked over Cale Street crossing (Echo News,

A PTA spokesperson confirmed noise monitoring had been completed at the Cale Street level crossing and nearby residential proper-

"The results of this monitoring will help to inform next steps, including potential noise mitigation measures," they said.

"Lighting and warning bells are a safety requirement that are required at every level crossing within the metropolitan rail network

and are required by the law.
"A well-lit level crossing ensures the safety of rail, vehicle and pedestrian traffic at night.

"Flashing lights are set by a national standard and are consistent at all active level cross-

"The operating times of the new Cale Street level crossing are similar to the previous Helena Street crossing.'

The PTA had previously responded to calls for noise mitigation by suggesting measures such as strategic landscaping and rail treatments, as reported in PTA comments on Cale Street (Echo News, May 3)

The PTA however gave no indication at the time that the PTA had been looking to implement double-glazing or blinds as suggested by nearby residents.

Mr Cooper said many questions also remained regarding reductions in parking, increased rail traffic, and how the PTA assessed the environment to conclude a level crossing was the best choice for the area.

'There are plenty of questions that still are unanswered, or answers are not clear," he said.

"How are the PTA and Metronet going to manage the increase in rail traffic with the introduction of the Bellevue Maintenance Facil-

"What is the anticipated impact on local residents and traffic with this increase?

"What standard has the intersection been built to?

"All mention is Main Roads, but this is a residential area.

"How were the initial environmental assessments conducted and what were the results?

This is in relation to the installation of the level crossing to the residential buildings.

The PTA had previously released material explaining that grade separations were considered but were challenging due to the area's built-up nature, land constraints and the need to cross both the passenger and freight rail.

The same document explains that Cale Street was chosen as it was identified as a connector road for the area.

"The other roads east of Midland Station were not planned or designed to cater for this type of movement," it read.

In a July response, PTA responds to Cale St noise and traffic worries (Echo News, July 26), the PTA said the new level crossing would maintain connectivity into the town centre and ensure traffic and pedestrians could cross the rail corridor safely.

The safety messaging ran counter to the material published by Metronet during the removal of level crossings on the Armadale line.

"Removing all 31 level crossings from the Transperth network is a priority for government to increase the safety of people walking, cycling and driving in the area, as well as to reduce road congestion and revitalise local communities with improved land use planning," the Metronet publication said.

## **Water Corp project supports housing** development in the eastern suburbs

CONSTRUCTION is set to begin on a \$73 million Water Corporation project to deliver essential wastewater infrastructure in Perth's fast-growing north-east.

Works include a 14.2km wastewater pipeline between Ellenbrook and Wangara, as well as major upgrades to a pumping station near the intersection of Gnangara Road and Drumpellier Drive in Henley

It will allow more wastewater to be safely conveyed for treatment, and support housing development in the City of Swan's urban growth corridor, which includes Ellenbrook, Brabham, Dayton and Caversham

Close to 1600 separate sections of pipeline will be used during construction, with valves, pipe and some fittings manufactured and supplied by Perthbased businesses.

Data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics showed an additional 11,500 people moved to Aveley, Ellenbrook, Bullsbrook, Beechboro and The Vines between 2019 and 2023, while nearby Brabham and Henley Brook added nearly 4800 residents.

Around 132,000 additional residents are expected to call the City of Swan home by 2050, making it one of Australia's fastest-growing local government

The 18-month project is expected to employ 150 people and involve tunnelling under Gnangara Road, Mirrabooka Avenue, Hartman Drive and Tonkin Highway to minimise traffic disruption.

It follows significant recent state government investment in the City of Swan.

In March 2024, Water Corporation completed a \$36.5m project to deliver a new drinking water pipeline in Henley Brook coupled with an 18-kilometre wastewater pipeline from Bullsbrook to Ellenbrook.

Work is also underway to install a 900m drinking water pipeline along The Broadway in Ellenbrook.

The state government has committed \$1.7 billion this financial year to new water, wastewater and drainage projects across Western Australia.

Water Minister Simone McGurk said Perth remains Australia's fastest-growing capital city, which highlights the need for strong investment in essential service infrastructure.

"Nowhere is that growth clearer than in the City of Swan's urban growth corridor, which encompasses suburbs like Ellenbrook, Brabham, Dayton and Caversham.

West Swan MLA Rita Saffioti said over the next 30 years, more people are expected to move to Perth's north-eastern suburbs.

September is Blood Cancer Month aimed at raising awareness of one of Australia's most prevalent and deadly cancers.

Every day, 53 Australians will hear the devastating words "you have blood cancer", with a further 17 people losing their life to the disease.

Blood cancer is a significant public health issue with an estimated one in 12 Australians to be diagnosed with blood cancer in their lifetime – the equivalent of 8 per cent of the Australian population.

Australian's understanding of blood cancer and the signs and symptoms is relatively low, with most people unaware of just how common blood cancer is

During Blood Cancer Month we aim to raise much needed awareness and educate Australians on the impacts of blood cancer, the signs and symptoms, and who to turn to for support if you or a loved one are diagnosed.

According to the Leukaemia Foundation, the main signs and symptoms of blood cancer are recurrent infections, increased fatigue, night sweats, bone pain, unexplained weight loss, and bruising or enlarged lymph nodes.

Early diagnosis can play a key role in surviving blood cancer, so it is crucially important that all Australian's are aware of the signs and symptoms and we encourage them to visit their GP or health professional to be examined and treated properly

## How can something so tiny kill in a matter of hours?

These days, stimulating toys are all about interactivity, lights, and movement. To activate, a button sized battery generally needs to be inserted, but if swallowed by a child has the power to cause severe injury in less than two hours and can even kill.

Button batteries are a small power source used not just for toys but for an increasing number of common household items such as remote controls, watches, clocks, and hearing aids.

A University of Sydney-led research study

showed batteries 20mm or more in diameter are the most dangerous.

They are small enough to be easily swallowed but not small enough to reliably pass through a child's throat.

What happens next will shock you, literally! An electrical current is immediately triggered by saliva, causing a chemical reaction to cause severe burns to the child's throat and major internal organs within as little as two hours and the results can be fatal.

The study, which examined over 400 cases of button battery injuries and fatalities worldwide, shows while Australia has introduced the world's first mandatory safety standards with child-resistant packaging, the industry still needs to do more.

Once the packaging is open there is a vital need for safe storage, safe use, and safe disposal of batteries.

When buying button battery operated products, parents should look for products where the battery compartment can't be opened without the use of a tool.

If the compartment is not securely fastened with a screw or similar fastener, the product may not comply and could be added to the product recall list.

Even when old or used, button batteries can still be a threat, so safely dispose of them by wrapping them in sticky tape and putting them in a child resistant container, out of reach of children until you can recycle them safely. Recycle collection points can be found at www. bcycle.com.au

If you suspect a child has swallowed a button battery do not let the child eat or drink and do not induce vomiting.

## Swan councillors raise issues with Brabham's structure plan

SWAN councillors want the proponent of the proposed Brabham 3 structure plan to deal with a number of issues including providing a revised traffic impact assessment based upon a scenario where Henley Brook Avenue is not extended southwards beyond a juncture with Youle-Dean Road.

A successful motion put forward by Swan Valley Gidgegannup councillor Rod Henderson said the structure plan failed to encompass the land to the immediate west that adjoined Drumpellier Drive, failed to articulate the detail of connections to the new Whiteman train station and so limited the plan as an effective instrument for orderly and proper planning

His motion also noted the submissions made to the city particularly those sub-missions opposing the local structure plan on the grounds of adverse environmental impact from vegetation clearing, the elimination of an ecological link and adverse impact of traffic.

It also noted that the proposal had been designed on the assumption of the extension of Henley Brook Avenue through to Reid Highway with Youle-Dean Road providing a road connection between Drumpellier Drive, and an extended Henley Brook Avenue and noted the council had not to date made any resolution to program the extension of Henley Brook Avenue south of Park Street.

The councillors also resolved to note that the proposed structure plan be modified where required to facilitate a scenario where Henley Brook Avenue was not extended southwards beyond a juncture with Youle-Dean Road.

The proposed structure plan is for land

situated south of Youle-Dean Road, east of Drumpellier Drive, which is surrounded to the south and east by Bush Forever site 200 and the metropolitan region scheme (MRS) alignment of the proposed Henley Brook Avenue extension.

The land is close to the new Whiteman Station under construction to the west of the site as part of the Morley-Ellenbrook

The Western Australian Planning Commission is the decision maker on the structure plan but the City of Swan gets to make a recommendation about the proposal.

Submitted by CLE Town Planning and Design on behalf of Peet Brabham in partnership with the Housing Authority, the owners of Lot 822 Youle-Dean Road, the proposed structure plan covers an area of 99.87ha of which about 43ha is indicated for residential purposes estimated to deliver 1500 dwellings and a population of about 4200 people.

About 17ha of public open space is proposed along with a primary school site of 4ha and a high school site of 8ha

According to an officer's report when the proposal was advertised 66 public submissions were received, including 53 objections.

'These objections relate to environmental concerns with loss of native bushland, wetlands and adverse impact on wildlife, loss of amenity and adverse impact of traffic on existing roads within surrounding rural localities," the officer's report said.

## **Mundaring's planning** scheme under review

SHIRE of Mundaring is embarking on a significant review of its local planning scheme and strategy to guide future land use and development.

Following the shire's successful application, the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) has endorsed the 'scheme review report', setting the stage for responsible development and growth.

The process will unfold in three stages, beginning with the preparation of a 'land use planning strategy', the findings and recommendations of which will then assist with preparing the new local planning strategy, as well as the creation of the new local planning scheme.

Each stage will be community-focused and involve extensive public consultation to ensure that the needs and aspirations of residents are

central to the planning process.

Shire President Paige McNeil said the new scheme and strategy will be guided by the principles outlined in the recently adopted council plan and will work towards delivering on the shire's vision of being the place for sustainable

"Everyone in our shire can be excited by the creation of a new and contemporary local planning scheme and local planning strategy that will align to our community's identified needs," she said.

"The WAPC's endorsement of a new local planning scheme will help us plan and achieve sustainable growth and responsible development, enhancing our shire's future planning outcomes for the benefit of us all.

"This forward-thinking approach aims to ensure that future growth is responsible, reflecting the Shire's commitment to a sustainable



## Support for liquor licensing changes

A SWAN Valley wine tourism business says it is generally supportive of the changes to the WA Director of Liquor Licensing policies, which are well overdue.

Sandalford chief executive officer Grant Brinklow said the changes had been well considered by government, by industry, by operators and by organisations such as the Australian Hotels Association.

Included in the changes are that training institutions offering work placement in hospitality for people under 18 now only have to apply once a year for the Director of Liquor Licensing to approve a specific course.

Previously, every student on every course needed individual approval to be

This removes a significant administrative burden on schools and TAFEs and encourages more trainees into the industry.

Mr Brinklow said the industry needed trainees

"Think about the Swan Valley these days, we retain our heritage and identity as one of the oldest and leading wine producing regions in Australia but increasingly the Swan Valley is about wine tourism," he said.

ism," he said.
"Wine tourism involves attracting visitors from Perth, intrastate, interstate and overseas to come to the Swan Valley for world-class unforgettable experiences – to do that it's all about people.

"You've got to have the right people whether they're front-of-house, restaurant and functions and waitstaff, chefs, sommeliers and wine educators so we need young people that see these areas – hospitality, tourism, leisure – as genuinely cre-

ating career paths for them.

"If you think about the Swan Valley of old it wasn't like that but nowadays the region is flourishing."

The policy changes mean young people aged under 18 employed on a licensed premises can now collect glasses.

The old policy stated a juvenile could not take the glasses when clearing a table because that was seen as a component of serving alcohol whereas the new policy acknowledges it is a cleaning task.

Mr Brinklow said they had long been employing staff under the age of 18 to provide all sorts of support services to their operations in the Swan Valley.

"But we don't have a beer garden and we're not a pub so we don't have people wandering around collecting glasses so that has no impact on us.

"But we're generally supportive of the changes and the modernisation of some of these regulations.

"In fact I think they are well overdue.
"We are supportive they are good ini-

"We are supportive, they are good initiatives.

"They're sensible changes and they generally I think will have a positive impact and also open up opportunities for young people to consider careers in hospitality and tourism that they perhaps might not have considered previously.

"We've been a long time supporter of employing young people who are still in school with the support of their parents and guardians to work in back-of-house areas at Sandalford even though we're a licensed premises.

"I don't expect the changes that have been made recently will fundamentally impact or alter the way we go about doing what we do at Sandalford but I emphasise again they're sensible changes and com-

mon sense."

He said they employed a lot of apprentices and the changes would fundamentally help organisations like them to just be able to get on and do things without being tied down to bureaucracy.

They employ young people from the region who don't necessarily want to work at a fast food outlet but do want to be in an environment like Sandalford's where they can learn skills that will help them develop careers over the long term.

"Obviously being under age they can't serve alcohol, they can't do that sort of thing but they can watch and learn, they can learn how to serve food all that sort of thing

"We need to be careful and sensible about how we nurture these young people but that is what we do as a matter of course for all our staff."

He thinks others in the Swan Valley wouldn't be any different as they were all striving to provide worldclass experiences.

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## Overture filming moves to Herne Hill

AS well as filming in York, as reported by *Echo News* on August 22, the comedy-drama production Overture has been filming in the City of Swan

Film crew and cast took over Strelley Brook cottage in Herne Hill last week, turning the heritage mud-brick house into an inside set for a day's filming.

Rex and Lina McCrae, who own Strelley Brook, said the process had made the property busy, with crew members coming in and out through the week.

"York may have the lion's share of the Overture glory and the brilliance of Bruce Beresford, but most everyone in the production team of this film has eaten minties from my grandmother-in-law's bone china," Mrs McCrae said.

"My only touch of complaint was Bruce's lack of knowledge about the beauty of WA, particularly the Swan Valley and its rich history."

The cottage is full of quirks and old-time character. As Mrs McCrae said, every wall is left of straight, the floorboards creak, the doors jam, and tall people hit their heads. But the mud brick walls of Strelley are solid and comforting, sturdy in their age, the perfect setting to house a production crew for an outback drama.

Mrs McCrae said Strelley Brook was no stranger

to the bustle of a production, either.

"Strelley has played host to a baker's dozen of ABC productions, a West Fashion photoshoot, a commercial and even a high school media assignment which won some awards," she said.

"Mr Beresford and the director of photography scanned our little BnB and deemed it suitable for their needs. The paddocks are to play host to the trucks, the neighbours will have semis on their verge and the lady down the road with a hardstand will have the 18-wheelers to contend with."

The production shot in York before moving closer to Perth, and is being supported by the state government's WA production attraction incentive and Screenwest. As a whole, the production will inject around \$3.5 million into the WA economy.

The cast includes Luke Bracey, Susie Porter, and Nicholas Hammond, and extras were sourced from local talent in York while the production was in town

Mr McCrae said the production coming to town was nothing but positive for the Swan Valley.

"Like York, the Swan Valley still has the look and feel of an Australian country town, complete with open spaces and wild characters. The Swan Valley is an understated jewel like that," he said.

"It's great to have these things happening in our local area, and more people should know these things are going on in the valley."

## Mia Davies hits the trail in Mundaring

MIA Davies continues her push to earn the trust of residents in the newly proposed federal seat of Bullwinkel and met with the Shire of Mundaring this week to discuss community priorities.

Ms Davies and Nationals Infrastructure and Transport and Regional Development spokesperson Senator Bridget McKenzie met with *Echo News* on Monday and spoke about the concerns they anticipated from Mundaring council and residents.

"I'm here to understand how we can get people moving as quickly and as safely around this community as possible and we've heard today from communities in the hills about the need for road infrastructure to make sure that that's a safer trip up and down the mountain," Ms Mc-Kenzie said.

"Also, telecommunications are a significant issue.

"Rolling out telecommunications infrastructure to communities, (is) something that we'll be having more focus on."

Ms Davies said telecommunications also fed into bushfire management concerns which remained a priority for hills residents.

"Really simple infrastructure stuff like battery backups and having that capacity in the aftermath of an emergency so people can be reconnected," she said.

"I see that right across my current electorate — certainly, an issue that will be raised again and

"We just need to see some funding going in to make sure that the resilience is built into the system, and it also impacts businesses.

"If you've got gaps in the system, so mobile black spots, you've got businesses that can't operate efficiently let alone the safety aspect."

A Shire of Mundaring spokesperson confirmed The Nationals members met with Shire President Paige McNeil and chief executive officer Jason Whiteaker and spoke about the expected issues.

"The meeting covered a range of topics, which are featured in the council's advocacy strategy with a particular focus on telecommunication resilience in the Perth Hills, potential funding opportunities for the Mundaring town centre and cultural hub project, Brown Park precinct redevelopment as well as the commitment from the shire of providing universally accessible public facilities, with a particular focus on female accessible changerooms," they said.

"The shire president, and council, will continue to advocate for the projects and priority areas with all candidates."

Ms Davies recognised the fresh challenge of representing the hills compared to the regions but said there were more similarities than differences.

"I know the National Party hasn't presented itself here in the hills and down in the foothills traditionally," she said.

"But my experience is that the issues we're talking about: telecommunications, bushfire preparedness, housing pressures, cost of living, the ability to work or retire close to the community you love — they're all issues that resonate and are very close to my heart as someone that's represented the broader regional community in the hinterland.

"So, my job is to come and listen and find out what the aspiration of that community is and then fight like anything to get it over the line, and we've got a history of doing that."

"Because of our smaller population centres here, because we are so remote, and I'm talking remote from Canberra, when they make decisions, they make them for Bendigo, Ballarat, Sydney and Melbourne.

"They don't make them for Western Australia, and I've banged my head against a brick wall for so long, I'm actually going to go to Canberra and try and have a go at it at the end where

the decisions are made — and that to me is important."

When asked how she will ensure that commonsense approach isn't lost from being so far from home, Ms Davies said connection to community was key.

"If you remain in your community, connected to it, then whatever happens in Canberra, you always got to come back and be able to be accountable," she said.

"The accountability, particularly in the electorate that I hold now, they hold you to a very high regard

regard.
"They don't necessarily expect you to win every fight, but they expect you to have the fight and be in the ring.

"Stay true to the values that actually got you to where you are today: family, your team, being part of a community — that's what grounds you.

"I think for me they've always been the most important things in my career no matter where I've been and no matter what role I've held, and that's not going to change."

## Morley-Ellenbrook line bus consultation

COMMUNITIES in Perth's north-east will see a major increase in bus services, with the opening of the Metronet Morley-Ellenbrook line later this year.

As a result there will be an expansion of bus services into newly-developed areas in Aveley, Brabham, Dayton and El-

In support of the new train line, 88 additional buses will be brought into service, equating to an additional five million bus service kilometres every year.

The big increase will result in more frequent services, improved operating hours and greater coverage across the community.

The Public Transport Authority has released its proposed bus network to support the five new train stations being built in Ellenbrook, Whiteman Park, Ballajura, Noranda and Morley.

The proposed bus services include new routes, while some existing routes will be changed or replaced.

Community feedback is being sought on the proposed bus services which will see improvements in general frequency and operating hours across the north-eastern suburbs.

The proposed bus network will also see high-frequency services connecting the new

ley bus station, which will be renamed to Galleria bus station and improved cross-regional links between the Ellenbrook, Yanchep and Midland Lines.

Timetables for train services and the supporting bus network for surrounding suburbs will be made available before passenger services start on the new train

Transport Minister Rita Saffioti said the new Morley-El-lenbrook line will be a game changer for communities in the north-east of the city.

"With the new train line opening at the end of the year, those living in our north-eastern suburbs will have greater transport choice with new train and bus services.

"While the community will see more frequent services, better operating hours and greater coverage, some services will see changes or be replaced, so it's important the community take the time to review these proposed new routes and provide feedback.

"The feedback from the community will help finalise the new bus network and ensure the best outcomes for the community.'

## Midland station's carpark milestone

THE Metronet Midland Station project completed its last concrete pour for the multi-storey car park on August 16.

The concrete slabs for the first three levels were already completed in July, and the August completion of level four is on schedule.

With level four's concrete pouring complete, work will continue with the fitout of services, including electrical, security, lighting

Later this year work on the car park's facade will commence.

As reported in Metronet Midland carpark due to complete this year (Echo News, June 28) the rest of the project, including a new 12-stand bus interchange and new cycling and pedestrian routes to get to the station, is due to be completed next year.

The milestone was celebrated with a topping out ceremony which is a Scandinavian tradition.

A tree is lifted to the highest point of the building to appease the tree-dwelling spirits whose habitat had just been destroyed.

It is to ward off evil spirits and bring good luck to the building's

The project team gathered on the top level of the carpark to celebrate with a barbeque and watched as a young pine tree was lifted to the top slab using a tower crane.

Construction of the new multi-storey carpark began in September 2023, which is on track to be commissioned by the end of the

Once the carpark opens, it will have more than 800 bays including 20 ACROD bays and 10 motorcycle bays, with the provision for future electric car charging points.



## Wasps in the regions



European wasps feed on grapes and other fruit, human and pet food, insects and dead animals like rats, kangaroos and bandicoots.

#### The European wasp 2023–24 season has drawn to a close with 94 nests found and destroyed in WA. Perth, Bunbury, Albany and Napier were all areas of invasion.

Every year fertilised queens of the European wasp (Vespula germanica) hitchhike into WA on vehicles, or in freight and cargo from interstate. They hibernate during winter and get to work on their nest in spring. These nests are predominantly hidden underground and within a few months, wasp numbers will reach the thousands. Locating these nests is like locating a needle in a haystack, except the haystack is 3/4 of WA, and the needle is a nest of angry wasps.

After 46 years of preventing the permanent establishment of this invasive species, the surveillance program has developed efficient early warning trapping systems and nest location techniques. This program targets the highest risk locations in WA, but it cannot cover everywhere. The success of the programs to date is due to continued public awareness and reporting. This is integral in regional and less populated areas, where there are fewer eyes to look out for the suspect signs of European wasps.

The nests located in Albany and Napier (about 20km north of Albany) this season, were due to public reports of suspect wasps. The department worked quickly to confirm the species, then installed trapping grids to determine the extent of the wasp presence. Nests were located and destroyed, but further surveillance will be needed next season to check if there are more to find.

European wasps were also detected in the Perth Hills and in Bunbury this season. In prior seasons they have invaded Geraldton, Kalbarri, Kalgoorlie, Hyden, Australind, Busselton, Donnybrook and Albany.

#### What to look for

European wasps have these distinctive behaviours:

- · Scavenging on human and pet food, dog bones and roadkill (carrion).
- Feeding on and damaging fruit like grapes, apples, pears and stone fruit.
- Nest underground nests are HUGE and grow to the size of a basketball in a single season. Underground nests and have a small (golf ball sized) entrance hole.

YORK has been named one of Airbnb's top 50 Tiny Towns in their new 'tiny towns guide' released last week.

The guide showcases 50 charming Aussie towns with populations under 3,000 people in a bid to drive regional travel, with York hitting fourth spot.

It comes as new research from YouGov reveals 'tiny town tourism' is in demand, yet some of Australia's best small towns could be flying under the

"For too long, the Albanese government has listened to noisy activists to the detriment of our farmers and rural communities. It needs to

stop.
"The government needs to get out of the way and let us do what we

do best - feeding and clothing the

The campaign has also gained the support of the young farmers advocacy group, AgConnectWA, who have begun fundraising in the fight of farmers and the farming industry.

"Importantly, however, this support shows that young people who want a future in sheep farming are not just laying down and giving up, Mr Sutherland said.

The young farmers raised more than \$30,000 for the Keep the Sheep campaign at a sold-out fundraising gala ball held last week, bringing the fundraising war chest to more than \$500,000 for advertising in marginal Labor seats in WA

The Keep the Sheep online petition has already attracted more than 87,000 signatures, far exceeding its original goal of 60,000 signatures.



## armac West returns as a four-day tarmac rally

AFTER a three-year break Perth's premier tarmac rally returns to its popular four-day format with a new naming rights sponsor, now known as Lance East Exotics Tarmac West, held from 12 to 15 September.

Over four days, 50 rally cars will race the clock on closed roads around Whiteman Park, Ellenbrook, Parkerville, Kalamunda, Toodvay, Maryville, Bullsbrook, Malaga and the City of Perth.

After a change of format for the past two years, and with sanctioning from the Australian Auto Sport Alliance (AASA), Tarmac Events is delighted to recommence longer competitive stages and return to the Perth Hills.

Dennis Heller of Helena Valley is working hard with his co-driver Frank Guildea and his crew to get his new replica Brock Commodore ready in time.

The development of Heller's 1983 V8 VH Commodore Group C car was sped up after he crashed his Mitsubishi Evo in Tarmac Events Albany Rally Sprint in March.

"I've been running Evos in past tarmac rallies, but since the crash in Albany where I wrote the car off, the long-term project to prepare the Commodore quickly became a short-term project," Heller said.

Heller, business owner of High Speed Engineering, estimates 600 hours have been spent working on the Commodore over the past two months.

"It's 99 per cent ready, and I'm really looking forward to going fast on closed roads,' the father of two said.



Six other competitors from the Perth Hills will join Heller and more than 40 other rally drivers to race to the clock along 240 competitive kilometres and drive a total of 908.5 kilometres.

A local driver to watch is Brett Morse from Maida Vale, who should be one of the front runners his 2019 BMW M2 Competition, with his co-driver Rodney Ng calling the notes.

"We've had a hiatus for a couple of years, so we'll be managing the event the best we can without causing ourselves not to finish to finish first, first you have to finish," Morse

"We are pretty excited to have Tarmac West back, my co-driver and I have compet-

ed for at least the last decade, both in WA and also over East.

"Big thanks to Ross Tapper and his team and his efforts to keep the event alive, we're very grateful for their hard work. Ross always runs his events with a much higher safety element than other events we've done," said Morse, a heavy duty diesel mechanic.

City of Kalamunda councillor and high school teacher Dylan O'Conner, also of Maida Vale will be one of the locals competing in his 1998 Hyundai Excel with co-driver Leigh Fowler.

Experienced rally competitors in Ireland, it's the first Tarmac West for Darlington's husband and wife team Brian and Hazel Turner in their 2000 Peugeot GTI.

Expect more than 400 stunning cars from yesteryear along with modern marvels, monster bus rides, helicopter rides, remote control cars entertainment, car clubs stalls, food trucks and more.

The new Sunday Perth City Cruise is a motorcade featuring hot rods, street machines and exotic supercars on everyone's wish lists. From 12pm, spectators can watch the

cars cruise along Barrack Street, Wellington Street, William Street, St Georges Terrace, Adelaide Terrace and Bennet Street

**SWAN Districts defeated Peel Thunder** by 17 points in last Saturday's WAFL qualifying final for a first finals victory in seven years and are now one win away from a first grand final in 14 years.

After Peel Thunder kicked five goals to three with the breeze in the first quarter, Swans took over the contest.

Swans ended up kicking seven goals compared with two from the Thunder over the last three quarters on the way to a 10.5 (65) to 7.6 (48) victory.

It's a first ever finals win for Swans against Peel and in Mandurah, and also a first finals win since 2017 and just a second since the 2010 premiership triumph.

One more win this finals series for Swans and they will qualify for the grand final and the first chance presents this Saturday against East Perth in the second semi-final.

Leigh Kohlmann provided a strong target in attack for Swans to kick another four goals to make the most of his opportunities from just six kicks and four marks to now

have kicked 48 goals for the season.

Brad Lynch and Jackson McLachlan also kicked two goals apiece in the win for the black-and-whites.

Nik Rokahr has had a brilliant first season in the WAFL in the midfield for Swan Districts and continued that in the qualifying final on Saturday finishing with 33 possessions, six tackles, six inside-50 entries and a goal.

Jve Chalcraft also ended up with 28 disposals and eight tackles with Aidan Clarke picking up 21 touches, Jesse Turner 20 (before injuring a knee), Jake Pasini 17, Josh Cipro 16 and Will Collins 15. Despite Liam Reidy having 65 hit outs in

the ruck for Peel, he had a minimal impact with Nathan Blakely a big reason for that who finished with 18 possessions, seven tackles and 11 hit outs of his own.

Despite kicking into the breeze in Mandurah, Swan Districts made the perfect start to their first ever final against Peel with the first two goals inside nine minutes thanks to McLachlan and Kohlmann.

Peel did respond with the next four goals

of the contest in the space of seven minutes before Swans did get a steadier through late inclusion Ben Hewett.

But the Thunder closed the quarter with a goal to Ollie Murphy on the siren and that saw the home team leading by 11 points at quarter-time.

Swans then started the second guarter on fire firstly with a goal to McLachlan and then two in the space of a minute to Lynch including one that came after a spectacular mark over his Peel defender.

Then when Kohlmann added a goal on half-time, it was Swan Districts going into the major break with the 13-point advantage on the back of kicking the only four goals of the second quarter.

Swans then pushed that lead out to 19 points to start the third term with a goal to prolific midfielder Nik Rokahr.

Then Kohlmann kicked his third of the day to stretch the lead to 23 points and it was still at 17 points by three quarter-time.

Kohlmann's fourth goal in the fourth term ensured Swan Districts would end up securing the 17-point victory.
