The link between poverty and the homeless

Dear Echo News,

Anti-Poverty Week (October 13-19) gives us a chance to focus on homelessness and its strong connections with poverty.

In Australia, more than 3.3 million people live in poverty, including more than 760,000 children. Every hour, 3000 people in Australia seek help from homelessness services like those provided by Mission Australia.

Our recent report with Orygen showed one in five young people faced financial stress in 2023.

Through my work as state director at IVIIS sion Australia, I see how homelessness deeply entwined with poverty – goes beyond lacking a safe home; it affects mental health, employment opportunities and overall quality of life.

Smith Family shines the light on poverty

National education The Smith charity Family is shining a light this Anti-Poverty Week, October 13-19 on the deepening digital divide that is holding many students back from making the most of their education, as part of a wider push to end child poverty.

Access to an appropriate digital device is crucial for a child's success at school.

But students experiencing disadvantage often cannot afford such items, limiting their participation in education and employment opportunities.

Gone are the days when pen and paper were the key materials a child needed at school. Digital devices are now non-negotiable in both the classroom and at home.

Students simply cannot hope to complete their homework and assignments without having these items and being digitally connected.

Currently, 30 per cent of students support-

ed through The Smith Family's learning for life education program are not digitally included, meaning they don't have access to a laptop or tablet, either their own or shared, in a household with mobile or broadband internet.

Digital inclusion means more than just having access to a device and a reliable internet connection. It also involves having the necessary skills and support to navigate the online world.

The latest NAP ICT literacy report found 25 per cent of Year 10 students and 40 per cent of Year 6 students don't have access to a suitable device outside school.

I have serious concerns about the ability of all students to thrive in the modern-day classroom and to be adequately prepared for future work and study opportunities if they do not have access to the necessary digital resources, home internet and technological support, as well as the chance to develop their digital literacy skills.

During Anti-Poverty Week, The Smith Family, WorkVentures and Good Things Foundation, are jointly highlighting the growing issue of digital poverty.

Work Ventures has supplied The Smith Family with 6400 refurbished laptops over the last two financial years.

The Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) is an invasive beetle posing a significant threat to Western Australia's trees and ecosystems.

Gun laws leave sports shooters in limbo

WHITEMAN Park hosted a successful state shooting carnival in the closing weeks of September and is set to host nationals next year, but the future of the sport remains uncertain.

Western Australian Clay Target Association (WACTA) vice-president Murray Cornish said the event was a success.

"It was a new format, and we tried to run it for eight days straight," he said.
"We ran trap for four days and the other

one was skeet for four days.

'It was a good success and (nationals) next year will be bigger and better."

Mr Cornish said the state carnival was a simulation ahead of the national event to be held in Whiteman Park on April 2 next year, but new gun law changes concerned shooters.

"Every second person I talk to wants to know what's happening with the gun laws," he said.

"There's been a lack of consultancy, the legislation and regulations aren't complete, and so we've been largely left in the dark.

"We've tried to suggest things - there's probably 10 different ballistics sports involved and each ballistics sports' presidents goes to the meetings with police and the law reform commission but they've told us what they'll do without much consulting.

"There's a lot of concerned people and having to deal with the new laws is going to have a big impact on our sport.'

Mr Cornish said the main concern were the gun limits which he was worried will affect the competitive shooting due to different formats requiring different guns.

"How did they come up with limits?" he said

"There are many different formats such down-the-line, skeet, International Shooting, Sport Federation shooting, sporting, and you can't use the same firearm for everything.

"The biggest thing is the numerical limit.

"In the law reform commission from 2016, one of the recommendations was that numerical limits don't have anything to do

"They've ignored that right through even though that was the 2016 recommenda-

Nationals Central Wheatbelt MLA and Bullwinkel candidate Mia Davies said law-abiding firearms owners have raised with her serious concerns about the new firearms laws.

"Competitive shooters, like members of the WACTA, are particularly worried about restrictions on the number of firearms they can own," she said.

"Many top-tier shooters who compete at state and national levels rely on more than five firearms to participate across various disciplines.

"Under (the) new laws, they'll be forced to surrender some of their firearms, limiting their ability to compete and potentially causing a decline in membership, which could put the future of some clubs and events at risk.

"There's also growing frustration about the lack of clarity on how these laws will be implemented, with regulations still not released, despite the laws coming into effect in early 2025.

Mr Cornish said not much could be done until the regulation came out, but he didn't think shooters would readily accept the

"We'll do what we need to save our sport," he said.

'The average shooter who goes to shoot at a range, are not the problem in society but we're targeted like criminals.

"The biggest thing the Western Australian Firearms Community Alliance did was the petition."

The petition Mr Cornish referred to was signed by more than 32,000 people opposing the Firearms Bill 2024.

Mr Cornish said he felt the petition was ignored and competitive shooters were at a

"You can't do anything in the courts until you know what the laws are," he said.

"Well, that was the highest petition put into Parliament and they took no notice and decided it wasn't relevant and they weren't interested.

"From here competitive shooters will have to keep the pressure going and let it be known that we're not in support of the changes, and come the election in March, we can try to reverse some of this.

"It's the only option we've got at the mo-

Opposition to York tip continues as EPA recommends its approval

LOCAL shires, residents, business and Indigenous groups have united in their continued opposition to the Allawuna landfill site near York.

After more than a decade fighting the proposal to store Perth's waste, this week the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) recommended approval of the new landfill site which could see up to 250,000 tonnes of waste dumped annually.

A state government spokesperson said while the minister had determined the appeals his decision

Following determination of the appeal, the Minister must then decide whether to grant final environmental approval under Section 45 of the Environmental Protection Act which allows the minister to consider broader issues that fall outside the scope of the EPA

'The minister will now consider the EPA's findings as well as other issues before deciding whether to approve," the spokesperson said.

"In determining the appeal, the minister was required to consider matters that fit within the scope

"Issues around planning and future needs in relation to waste infrastructure sits outside of the EPA.

"To be clear, determination of the appeal does not equate to ministerial approval for this project.

"The appeals raised several matters that were beyond the EPA's scope, and the minister will consider them alongside the report when making his final decision on implementation.'

Shire of York chief executive officer Chris Linnell said council was disappointed with this week's

"While we acknowledge the outcome, it is important to note that this is not the final stage of the process. As highlighted by the appeals committee, there are significant considerations that fall beyond the scope of this review," Mr Linnell said.

"The shire remains committed to opposing this proposal and will continue to work with all stakeholders to advocate for a final outcome that serves the best interests of the York community.

"The decision-making process is ongoing, and we will pursue a resolution that reflects the values and concerns of our residents."

York Business Association president Karen

Thomas said the fact that the concerns of residents and businesses via a petition of over 1000 signatures were not considered was an issue.

"Although I understand they are not relevant to the EPA decision we would still hope they would be considered in any final decision by the minister," she said.
"The big growth in our population and visitor

numbers and the fact we are now one of the go to areas for film production in WA should all be taken into consideration as we are primarily a tourist destination

"Our members and businesses rely on this and are very concerned these hard won benefits are not lost including the major recent success of 'Runt' and the influx of people to the town because of it."

Mrs Thomas said the issues with the black cockatoos and the Aboriginal birthing site have to be addressed, and this could involve federal intervention as they are involved in all shire road clearing where there are any possible black cockatoo nesting areas and this should apply to the proposed

Barladong Elder Dr Marion Kickett who in April met with the EPA appeal committee chair Dr Garry Middle said she didn't want any disturbance of the sacred dreaming of the Waagle (serpent) that created the water ways around the site.

"We have spiritual connections to country. If children died during childbirth they were buried there – we don't want the area disturbed, they are disturbing our sacred areas of our birth and burial site. The site has been used for probably thousands of years as a place where women give birth," she said.

"I am very disappointed in their decision and I will be attending the Balardong Corporation AGM which will be held in Northam on Saturday. I will be addressing members of the Barladong Corporation at this meeting, and working on strategies to address this decision.

Shire of Mundaring President Paige McNeil said council had previously expressed concerns relating to possible environmental impacts relating to the potential for leachate flow to the downstream water catchment areas, and the potential increase in traffic movements on Great Eastern highway.

A spokesperson for the City of Swan said the city had no comment on the EPA decision.

Ellenbrook boy aims for world BJJ championships

NINE-YEAR-OLD Ellenbrook boy Jarrah Blackmore is training hard ahead of next year's Brazilian jiu jitsu world competition, having taken part in 35 competitions in the two years since he began.

He has competed and won multiple state titles and competitions in Perth and the southwest for his age, belt and weight and came second place in the International Brazilian jiu jitsu Federation (IBJJF) Pan Pacific Championship in Melbourne.

Jarrah trains Brazilian jiu jitsu (BJJ) out of Ellenbrook's Perth Martial Arts Centre under the guidance of master Goioere and his son William Dias, who is also a multi-time world BJJ champion.

Master Goioere said Jarrah's journey has been an uphill battle against fierce competitors from over east where more opportunities to compete created tough opponents to defeat.

"In his division it's always very tough with a lot of good kids but we're very happy with the way he's doing," he said.

"We're very isolated here but

"We're very isolated here but his level is comparable to the other kids who have it easier because they compete more than him.

"In Perth we're so far from everything and big competitions you need to spend a few big dollars to travel there.

"If you talk about Brazil, it's different, but here (in Australia) kids have a lot of things to do for fun so it's hard to focus on jiu jitsu."

Master Goioere said Jarrah's unique strength was his outstanding stamina.

"One particular thing Jarrah has is his stamina is unbelievable — since he began in BJJ his stamina was always very good, and his fitness," he said.

"When he does private lessons with me sometimes, I make him go for one hour non-stop and we work on cardio and techniques for an hour and the other students gas out but he doesn't.

"I think for some kids, their parents have to push them very hard to do things but it's an easy job for (Jarrah's father), because he loves to be involved as much as he can and is serious about it, but Jarrah loves it so it's easy.

"If (Jarrah) could, he would live at the sum"

live at the gym."

Jarrah's father Gordon Blackmore said training in Ellenbrook was a supportive environment for a developing BJJ practitioner as the grappling community's bond was strong in the area.

"It's good training here because you see friends from school and friends you might see at inter school carnivals you might meet," he said.

"Your competition team's pretty tight knit — the kids from

this club compete a lot and their team is very tight knit."

Mr Blackmore said he began training BJJ from a humble invitation by a friend who practised the grappling martial art.

"So, how he got started, his best friend actually started doing it first and kept asking and kept asking and finally he decided to come down and try it," he said.

"He was doing soccer at the time and decided this was more fun and what he wanted to stick

"Jarrah decided to go from there and started training full power at this."

The road ahead remains full of action for the young Ellenbrook

action for the young Ellenbrook grappler.

Mr Blackmore said Jarrah's journey will eventually build

Mr Blackmore said Jarrah's journey will eventually build up to him aiming to compete in the world BJJ championships in Abu Dhabi next year and will be looking for support to get him there.

"Next year, he will be attending the Abu Dhabi World Championships along with as many state titles in Australia as we can get to," he said.

"We will be looking for potential sponsorships and doing some fundraising to help assist getting him over there."

At the end of October, Jarrah will be reattending the IBJJF Pan Pacific Titles in Melbourne looking to replace his previous silver medal win with gold.

Petitioners ask for another study

THE Noise Wall Action Group presented a petition with 241 signatures relating to the Movida noise wall at the City of Swan's ordinary council meeting on October 9.

The petition asked the city to support the group's request that an independent consultant be hired by the city, selected in conjunction with the community, to conduct new sound measurements at various times and locations with and without a noise wall.

"This will help us understand how the noise wall affects train noise for homes on both sides of the freight rail line and how to respond to the council's July motion seeking a community preference for solution," the petition said.

The councillors decided the petition

would be referred to the chief executive officer Stephen Cain with a report to be submitted to a future council meeting.

Freight train noise wall failure (Echo News, February 17, 2023) reported Swan View and Stratton residents saying the noise from freight trains, which never used to bother them, had become unbearable since the construction of the noise wall.

According to the city the noise wall met the requirements placed on the developer by the Western Australian Planning Commission.

The Noise Wall Action Group is a Swan View Community Association sub-committee.

In her statement to the council, chair Angela Charlesworth said people just wanted their lives to go back to the way they were before the noise wall was built.

"Many people are concerned about the consequences of the yet to be built sections of this wall and many people are expressing their shock and distress with the increased noise resulting from the section currently being built opposite Stratton," she said.

Following the February 8, 2023 council meeting an acoustic consultant was engaged to investigate noise reflections off the eastern side of the noise wall with two reports produced - one was based on desktop noise modelling and the second incorporated updated modelling and onsite noise measurements at five locations.

The city has said the results of noise monitoring were inconclusive, with the best fit noise model showing relatively low changes in noise levels from the construction of the wall to the residences to the east, such that mitigation was not considered necessary by the consultant.

The introduction to the Freight train preliminary noise modelling report (Movida estate noise wall) prepared for the city by Lloyd George Acoustics and presented to the December 13, 2023 meeting said the report reviewed modelling methodology and the possibility of reflected noise associated with freight trains by way of a desktop study.

The desktop study produced results from noise modelling using Kilde algorithms and NORD2000 algorithms from 15 Stratton and Swan View premises located on Burton Retreat, Kurrden Way, Blackadder Road, Ella Courtyard, Spinebill Drive, O'Connor Road, Redgum Lane, Gumnut Close, Fussel Green and Yeates Lane.

Some Kalamunda trees lost to PSHB

WITH more polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) infestations found each month since it was first detected in Lesmurdie in August, the City of Kalamunda is trying to stop the spread of the invasive beetle.

The city said the pest was first detected in Turner Park and Marri Crescent, Lesmurdie, in August and September, and most recently, a positive infestation was found earlier this month on Elizabeth Street in Kalamunda.

'Under the PSHB National Eradication Program, led by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD), the city has been advised of the necessary removal of infected trees, including a river sheoak and a black locust, to reduce the spread and protect the local tree population," a city statement said

A community information session on PSHB will be held at Pickering Brook Sports Club at 6.30pm on Wednesday, November 6.

The one-hour session includes a 45-minute presentation covering the pest's biology, life cycle, the types of trees at risk, signs of infestation and how to report suspicious activity.

Last month Bullwinkel candidate Mia Davies said it was time significant resources were allocated for research into management solutions, as there was no guarantee that the pest could be eradicated.

DPIRD has outlined measures they are trying to get rid of PSHB such as plastic wrapping, which has been put forward by some as a possible way to kill the in-

A DPIRD spokeswoman said as part of the PSHB eradication, the department had examined the use of partial wraps in a few high value trees with small infestations at Kings Park and at Perth Zoo.

This approach is showing promise but has limited application," she said.

'Mesh trunk wraps have been trialled in the US as a preventative measure to PSHB attack in relatively small trees. In addition to trialling other treatments, DPIRD has been liaising with international scientists and remains open to exploring a range of measures to control this invasive pest."

Nats to overturn sheep ban

THE Nationals, on both a state and federal level, along with farming groups have again called on the federal government to rescind its decision to ban live sheep exports, rejecting an increase in the funding package for the industry.

The Nationals federal leader David Littleproud earlier this week reiterated that a future coalition government will reinstate the live sheep export trade, following Labor's announcement of 'extra funding' for the 'transition' to phase out the trade.

Mr Littleproud said the extra \$32.7 million shouldn't be there in the first place.

"Farmers don't want compensation, they want their industry," Mr Littleproud said.

"If they're not in the industry, there will be the senseless death of millions of sheep from those countries who take up this market, that don't have our animal welfare standards.

"The Nationals support our farmers and our live sheep export trade and will ensure our live sheep trade returns under a future Coalition Government.

"In fact, if elected, as future Agriculture Minister, one of the first things I will do is travel to the Middle East to bring back confidence and restore trade relationships to those who seek our world-class live sheep from Australia.

"This funding is disingenuous and a mere PR exercise.

"It does nothing to help the 3000 farmers who have had their livelihoods taken away.

"Since Labor's previous announcement for a transition

package of \$107m, which included just \$64.6m for sheep producers and the supply chain side, not one cent has gone to helping our live sheep farmers."

Mr Littleproud said live sheep exports from Australia also increased from 380,000 in 2022 to more than 654,000 in 2023, but the WA flock was now decreasing from 12 million and expected to drop to eight million by 2025, with the state likely to start seeing the closure of abattoirs.

Liberal candidate for Bullwinkel Matt Moran, who has been meeting outraged farmers around Bullwinkel and travelled to Canberra for the Keep the Sheep rally, said farmers feel rejected by

Middle Swan sculptor heads to Bondi

MIDDLE Swan sculptor Ron Gomboc will be exhibiting at Sculpture by the Sea in both the Cottesloe and Bondi versions of the iconic

The exhibition is the world's largest free to the public outdoor sculpture exhibition featuring more than 100 sculptures this year.

Since its inauguration in 1997, artists have competed to have their work exhibited as part of the exhibition, and over the 20 years of running, Sculpture by the Sea has shown more than 2650 sculptures by artists from 51 countries.

Mr Gomboc said his piece in the exhibition was inspired by the feeling of looking for sunshine on a cloudy

"All my sculptures are inspired by human emotions," he said.

"Silver Lining is based on looking for a positive outcome when faced with adversity.

"My work is inspired by my life's experiences and each sculpture must have its own story and meaning.

Mr Gomboc was born in Slovenia in 1947 and said his formative years in Europe and his love for European sculpture continued to influence his craft and inspirations.

"I have been sculpting for more than five decades and the biggest influence was my childhood in Europe and exposure to some monumental, meaningful art," he said.

"Creating a sculpture goes through phases, first an idea which is captured in a drawing, from there a small model or maquette is made which I then enlarge to the scale I want, in this instance more than 3m.

"All my work is designed and made in my studio in Middle Swan. Depending on the size and the materials it can take many months.

Mr Gomboc's sculptures have been exhibited in galleries and collections the world over, in countries including China, South Korea, the USA, France, Dubai, Oman, Malaysia, Singapore and in both public and private collections in Australia.

He was in the army, serving in the Royal Australian Engineers from 1969 until 1971 and started part time art studies at the Claremont School of Art while still in national service.

He said free-to-the-public exhibitions like Sculpture by the Sea helped build an artist's profile and exposed their work to a bigger market.

"From the early days, exhibiting in outdoor exhibitions has been beneficial to my career, especially Sculpture by the Sea which gave me the opportunity to submit my design and then be accepted to participate at both Bondi and Cottesloe exhibitions.

Nationals' federal candidate for the new electorate of Bullwinkel Mia Davies MP joined Opposition leader Shane Love, candidate for the state electorate of Kalamunda Lisa Logan and Senator Bridget McKenzie to present The Nationals' view on what they called the state government's flawed firearm reforms.

Ms Davies said the turnout was indicative of the frus-

tration felt by law-abiding gun-owners across the state in the wake of the Labor Government's legislation.

"Minister Papalia has treated this community with complete disdain, painting them as criminals and people to be feared," she said.

'His view of the world couldn't be further from the truth. Gun owners are Olympians, volunteers in our community, business owners, friends, colleagues and family not the enemy.

Leader Shane Love said the fact that The Nationals WA had drawn a crowd of more than 200 people in the Perth metropolitan area showed that the party's stance was resonating with many people disappointed with the state Labor government.

Four Cassius accused face trial in February

THE four people facing charges after the death of Noongar Yamatji teenager Cassius Turvey are due in court for a status conference on November 15.

On October 10 WA's Chief Justice Peter Quinlan rejected an application by Jack Brearley – one of the four accused of Cassius' murder – to have some of his charges heard separately.

The Chief Justice has suppressed the reasons for his decision. The case involving Brearley along with Aleesha Gilmore, Mitchell Forth and Brodie Palmer is listed for trial in February

All four have entered not guilty pleas.

Fifteen-year-old Cassius was allegedly attacked with a metal pole as he walked in Middle Swan with friends on October 13,

As reported in Three more charged with murder of Cassius Turvey (Echo News, January 28, 2023) Cassius spent five days in hospital before being sent home where he suffered a seizure

He was placed in an induced coma but died on October 23. In the days and weeks after Cassius' death, thousands gathered across Australia at more than 40 vigils and rallies to remember his life.

Moving forward after Cassius, (Echo News, June 24, 2023) reported on his mother Mechelle Turvey delivering a powerful message to the young people affected by his death.

She said while she was there to carry on Cassius' legacy of being a mentor and leader, who people went to when they had a problem, she would not do it alone and called on them to

SHIRE of Mundaring Council adopted the Youth Informing Strategy 2025-2029 at the ordinary council Meeting held on Tuesday, October 8.

This strategy articulates council's commitment to create opportunities for connection, growth and to encourage our young people to engage in decision making that impacts future generations," Ms McNeil said.

Bushfire awareness focus of Kalamunda Community Day

THE Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) Bushfire Community Day held earlier this month at the Kalamunda Community Centre was a huge success with more than 2500 in attendance.

The event, a collaboration between DFES and the City of Kalamunda, was a mixture of family fun and education – families teaching young kids about fire risks; adults learning about fire risk mitigation and fire threat response.

Demonstrations showcased or described traditional techniques, including Indigenous cultural burns, as well as more modern technology such as virtual reality.

There was also a practical display about fire-wise gardening, a bushfire preparedness

trail and virtual reality booth, along with lots of DFES firefighters and firefighting equipment on site at 'hands-on' interactive displays

Event host chief superintendent Bushfire Centre of Excellence John Tillman said the free and interactive event was designed for all ages to learn how to stay safe in bushfire season while having fun with family and

"Bushfire Community Day is a great opportunity to learn more about Western Australia's dynamic emergency services, with opportunities for the kids to get up close with fire trucks and meet their local firefighters," he said.

"Attendees got to see burn over drills in action, demonstration on how to safely manage a planned burn and the opportunity to

ask the experts on how to limit bushfire risk including having a bushfire plan, knowing the fire danger rating system and preparing your property and emergency kit.

Mr Tillman said the event was a great chance for big and little kids to meet firefighters, hold a fire hose, climb aboard a fire truck or take a virtual ride in the RAC Rescue Helicopter.

'But more than that, parents were able to teach their kids some really valuable lessons about fire safety and also get some tips for how they can make their own homes and gardens more fire safe."

He said the Kalamunda Community Centre was a great venue that worked really well, and having the Red Cross, BoM and DPIRD involved added extra interest as well

'And I think everybody got the day's key

message: bushfire is a dangerous part of life in Australia, but the risks can be mitigated with awareness and a little forethought. It is essential to have a bushfire plan – it only takes 15 minutes to make one using the free My Bushfire Plan app or website.

Information tents were hosted by the City of Kalamunda emergency management team, Australian Red Cross and Bureau of Meteorology, while the DPIRD animal welfare in emergencies' team provided displays and information for visitors.

Joining the fun were Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson and City of Kalamunda Mayor Margaret Thomas.

Both noted the importance of communitv fire danger awareness and preparedness, especially as we face what may be another long, hot summer.



\$10m boost for firefighting fleet

THE state's aerial firefighting fleet has received an additional \$10.1 million in state government funding to help keep Western Australians safe ahead of what is expected to be another challenging bushfire season.

Two additional Black Hawk helicopters will be brought on to the state aerial firefighting fleet to provide rapid response to bushfires across WA, as part of the state's biggest ever aerial firefighting fleet of ex-military aircraft.

The helicopters, which can hold up to 4500 litres of water each, will be online for the 2024-25 and 2025-26 seasons and based in strategic locations to the north and south of the metropolitan region.

Premier Roger Cook and Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson made the announcement last week while visiting the site of the new Cardup Career Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS) Station, which is on track to be completed in December this year

\$14.5m facility fulfils a major Labor govern ment election commitment to future-proof demand for emergency services in Perth's rapidly growing south-east corridor

The station will receive three state-of-the-art appliances and be crewed by 36 firefighters, part of a multimillion-dollar investment in career personnel.

It comes as the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) launched its annual bushfire safety campaign, highlighting that it takes just 15 minutes to make a plan which could save your property or your life.

This year's campaign is being launched more than a month early due to an increased risk of bushfires.

More than 93 per cent of WA is bushfire-prone, yet only 1.95 per cent of households have a recorded

Prolonged periods of dryness have left a large amount of mature fuel throughout WA, which is why Western Australians are being urged to get ready for what could prove to be an extremely challenging

The My Bushfire Plan app and website helps users make the critical choice of leaving early or staying to defend and has important prompts including what to do with pets and what is needed if you have to evacuate.

Visit www.mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au or download the app from the Apple Store or Google Play.

Premier Roger Cook said his government was stepping up to invest in the best facilities, equipment and resources possible, as well as more firefighters to help keep Western Australians safe from the growing risk of bushfires

"We've acted early ahead of a potentially tough season to secure two extra Black Hawks, which will provide invaluable support for firefighters on the ground as they work to protect lives and homes," Mr Cook said.

Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson said his dedicated emergency services personnel are getting ready for summer – now it's time for all Western Australians to play their part and spend 15 minutes creating a bushfire plan.

Department of Fire and Emergency Services Commissioner Darren Klemm said the 2023-24 bushfire season was longer and more intense than experienced in recent years which should serve as a wakeup call to the community.

'The first emergency-level bushfire arrived much earlier than usual, in October 2023, and over the seven months that followed firefighters battled 5088 bushfires – 1000 more than the previous season," he

"But the reality is firefighters can't be at every home during an emergency, so it's important that people sit down with their family now, complete a bushfire plan and agree on a course of action to keep them safe using the My Bushfire Plan app or website.'

Education in Western Australia

In Western Australia, children can start their education in kindergarten, however compulsory schooling starts the following year in

Pre-primary and continues until the end of Year 12.

All children of compulsory school age must be enrolled in school and attend every day - that is the law. This is from the beginning of the year in which a child reaches the age of 5 years 6 months until the end of the year in which the child reaches the age of 17 years 6 months or turns 18, whichever happens first.

You need to apply to enrol your child if they are:

Starting kindergarten at a school or community kindergarten – 4

starting pre-primary and enrolling in their first year of compulsory schooling – 5 years old by 30 June

starting Year 7 – the first year of secondary schooling

changing schools new to Western Australia.

You can find out what year children need to start school with our school-age calculator available at www.education.wa.edu.au/enroll-

Schooling options include public education in government schools, private education in non-government schools and home schooling.

There are alternatives to full-time schooling. For older students, this usually requires an exemption from schooling or, in the case of the final years of compulsory education, a notice of arrangement.







On our recent family holiday, we went to Dryandra Woodlands near Narrogin. We stayed in old cottages and had a lovely time 'hanging out' together, playing board games, and toasting marshmallows by the fire. During our bushwalks we managed to spot a number of rare animals in the woodlands – echidnas and

Numbats are a special little creature, which is why they are our State's faunal emblem. Critically endangered, they are only in a few pockets of bush in WA – one being Dryandra Woodlands.

Numbats are squirrel-like, with a bushy long tail and body stripes. Art group celebrates 15 years with vibrant exhibition

FIBRANT Art Group celebrates 15 years of community and creativity with the Gather exhibition at Ellenbrook Arts.

The artworks exhibited in Gather range from large, colourful wall hangings to intricate sculptures, reflecting the diversity of their artists.

Echo News talked to three of the group's members about the group and its collective work: Joyce Tasma who works in mixed media, utilising pieces of the environment she collects on her many travels and adventures, from bushwalks close to home to trips to Mauritius with family, Ayako Goto who uses her family's kimono silk to create fibre-fused pieces, adding in found objects ranging from flower seeds to fish scales, and Bec Suardana whose work is in felting and mixed media, using colour and form to create tangible pieces.

These three women are just a taste of the diversity of the Fibrant group, which Joyce said has hosted a range of backgrounds, interests and abilities since its inception 15 years ago

"We really reflect the population of Perth, how diverse that population is, and how people's different backgrounds can impact their art," she said.

"This group is unique in that we don't focus on one medium, so everyone can bring something different, and there's no competition but everyone can get so many new perspectives on their work."

Bec said the group felt like a true community, and the expertise and vast knowledge of the women in the group was invaluable.

"If you're stuck on something, you can ask the group, and everyone will have a different solution for you. The weaver might suggest something, the sculptor might suggest something else. And so, you've got all these different ways of looking at your art that you wouldn't have considered yourself," she said.

Fibrant comes together weekly to socialise and work on their respective art pieces.

Joyce said this time is special for the women, many of whom have jobs and families, to find their peace and express themselves.

"We really get to let go of all other obligations for a few hours when we come to art group," she said.

"It's time for ourselves and our art, and it's great to have a community to share it with."

The group was first based in a heritage-listed house in Bassendean, which they met and worked in for 10 years.

They have now moved to Bayswater and continue to provide a community and creative space for older female artists to share their voices and stories, however Joyce said the group would be eager to expand their membership to a younger demographic.

"We would love to include younger artists in our group, and we would be excited to see what they bring to it," she said.

"Membership is also very laid-back. We come when we can, or when we want to. There is no pressure to be at every weekly meeting or to sign up for a whole year of membership. We just want women to come and find a place where they can practice their art and meet a new community."

Artists will be running talks and demonstrations of their creative processes in the gallery every weekend until the exhibition closes.

The Gather exhibition will continue at Ellenbrook Arts until October 26 and is free to enter


