"How can I explain about this perfect match, her and I, a match that was meant to be, I won't even try, there wouldn't be enough time but I was lucky enough to live it for 28 years, it felt as if we were together for a lifetime, as I've been thinking over the last few weeks my thoughts are crammed full with happy memories of fun, great times, some sad times and of love.

"Elizebeth worked for National Australia Bank for 12 years, she loved the job and gave her all and sometimes

above what was expected, the number of times we ran into people who were customers of Elizebeth at the Midland branch sang her praises of how much she helped or did for them, this happened regularly when we were out.

"Elizebeth loved pretty things, I guess that's why she fell in love with me, she loved pink things, Elizebeth was in her element, with all her beads,

bows, ribbons and anything glittery and shiny.

"Elizebeth was so proud of herself, I was proud of her when people wanted to order and pay for these spectacular cards as gifts, her spare time was taken up making her cards, sorting all her pretty craft stuff and watching YouTube for inspiration to create her cards.

"Sadly, around this time her eye problems started, then her other health issues were to follow in the next few years.

"I will now take life's journey by myself, a journey I thought would be with Elizebeth at my side – never dreaming it would Elizebeth."

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# Water Corp meets with Chidlow residents

**GUANHAO CHENG** 

WATER Corporation has confirmed there is a power curtailment agreement with Western Power affecting pumping capacity as Chidlow and Wooroloo residents continue chasing solutions for pressure-related is-

Chidlow resident Roberta Selleck chaired the meeting attended by about 35 residents, including residents from Wooroloo who were also experiencing issues with water outages and fluctuations.

Wooroloo residents met with Water Minister Simone McGurk during a February 4 meeting, but Ms McGurk did not attend the Chidlow meeting citing heavy commitments.

Mrs Selleck said candidates at a state and federal level from the major parties were in attendance and expected the issue to be known to all parties as a result.

"Our local candidates are definitely doing the right thing as we were being heard by the candidates and those with interest in what's going on in Chidlow and Wooroloo," she said.

"What we're incredibly disappointed by was Minister McGurk's inadequate response at this point in time.

"She wrote us a letter claiming heavy commitments and basically told us that the Chidlow scenario was still under investigation, even though we know there are reports that have gone to the minister.

'So fundamentally Minister McGurk is undertaking stalling tactics and has not made any commitments to resolve the issues."

Mrs Selleck began experiencing water issues in January 2023 and made a complaint as the low water pressure meant they weren't able to shower at night as reported in Residents say water not pumping enough in Chidlow (Echo News, January 31)

She then headed an action group within the Chidlow Progress Association, recording the number of impacted households and continu-

ing to liaise with Water Corporation and relevant parties for the affected residents.

In Water Corporation responds to Chidlow complaints (Echo News, February 7) it was reported that Water Corporation had installed a header tank and pump at Mrs Selleck's property, but a wider community solution was still needed.

A Water Corporation spokesperson said there was a power curtailment agreement in place.

"Like many high energy users, Water Corporation occasionally reduces its electricity use during high demand periods to support wider stability of the power grid.

"This arrangement has been in place for more than 15 years and includes infrastructure which draws on high amounts of electricity, including pumping capacity along the Goldfields pipeline. "Since April 1, 2024 electricity

"The Chidlow pump station is

part of the wider Goldfields Agricultural Water Scheme, up to and including Kalgoorlie and receives water via the Goldfields pipeline.

'Water Corporation is continuing to investigate the root cause of low-pressure issues to a small number of properties in Chidlow and is communicating with those customers direct-

Mrs Selleck said Wooroloo residents had received a letter from Water Corporation which outlines they would not be resolving the area's low pressure issues but will put in place non-standard service agreements.
"(This) abrogates Water Corporation re-

sponsibility for the standards of the service

being supplied," she said.

"The Chidlow residents are concerned this will become the default solution which means the issue won't be resolved and will only become exacerbated as development and growth continues.

The letter Wooroloo residents received confirmed Water Corporation wouldn't investigate the area's water pressure any further.

"As your property is serviced under a non-standard water service (NSWS) agreement, it is important to understand that fluctuations in water pressure are a known and expected condition on your service," it said.

"While we recognise that changing water pressure has caused frustration, these fluctuations are inherent to the nature of the NSWS arrangement.

"As such, Water Corporation will not be proceeding with further investigations into water pressure in the area.

We understand that this outcome may be disappointing, but it reflects the terms of service agreed upon for properties with a non-standard water service.

"If you remain concerned or wish to seek further review of the decision, you may contact the energy and water ombudsman.

"We hope this provides clarity and understanding of Water Corporation's final position and we thank you for working with us through this process.'

Kalamunda resident Amanda Newell said from the perspective of the residents opposing the develat Stirk Park on Saturday in a show of strength opment, the DAP process was problematic as the to oppose the new McDonald's and car wash de-process afforded a short timeline for residents to research into planning and provide feedback which is then summarised for the assessment panel.

"Noting only planning elements are considered," she said.

"We feel this process does not allow a true representation of community concern and is all about a planning process.

Greens candidate for Kalamunda Janelle Sewell said the development had not addressed several key concerns in the submitted plans.

"I think we have got a lot of support out there and the plans aren't entirely transparent in terms of the liveability of the trees (on the site)," she said.

'The traffic testing that they did wasn't for Canning Road, it was for Heath, and obviously Canning is the busy one."

Residents had previously cited traffic congestion concerns and the removal of mature trees as some of the major concerns driving their opposition of the new development.

It is not widely understood that AI requires huge amounts of power and water.

The first law of thermodynamics (conservation of energy) says that energy cannot be created or destroyed, but merely changed.

So, every watt of energy a non-renewable generator releases will find its way into the environment, whether it be from the cooling tower belching steam or the rivers and streams used to cool the plants or domestic and commercial use.

A recent ABC news item (January 28) reported: "Previous studies have focused on AI's energy usage and generating an image takes about as much energy as fully charging your phone, while water usage shows a 50-question ChatGPT conversation may use about half a litre.

Scientific American Magazine reported: "Technology giants like Microsoft have announced billion-dollar plans to build data centres around the country. In some cases, they've inked deals to power the facilities with nuclear and low-carbon energy.

Another article states "1.5 million servers would consume at least 85.4 terawatt-hours of electricity annuallymore than what many small countries use in a year.'

Further, amounts of energy are used in mining cryptocurrencies such as Bitcoin.

Just as worrisome, creating these digital resources guzzles energy at a prodigious rate, contributing to climate change.

Just read your article about low water pressure in Chidlow, Water Corp responds to Chidlow complaints (Echo News, February 7).

I wish to make you aware of the problems with water and water pressure we have been experiencing over probably 30 years.

I have approached three ministers now and also the ombudsman still to no avail.

We have experienced in some periods bursts on the main with regular occurrence.

In some bad periods it has burst every couple of weeks over a 12-month period, with one neighbour recording over 70 bursts with outages lasting a few days.

Water Corp, against our advice installed a pressure reduction valve on the pipeline which has resulted in some residents getting no water at all when the pumps at Chidlow aren't oper-

To add insult to injury, Water Corp behind was consulted, started putting customers on service agreements or non-standard water service agreements negating their responsibility to provide a consistent service at a reasonable pressure, urging customers to install their own water tanks and pressure pump and water purification system for water supply of two days!

This struck a chord when I read your article about Chidlow residents.

# Libs and Nats critical of Labor's cool the schools

LIBERAL leader Libby Mettam and Nationals leader Shane Love both agree WA Labor's cool the schools package should have already been an ongoing project, not just an election

Eighty-nine million dollars is promised by the Cook Labor government to deliver air conditioning upgrades at some of WA's oldest public schools, if re-elected.

The upgrades are intended to improve learning environments for students, teachers and school staff, according to a Labor spokesperson.

"Air conditioning has become a necessity in many parts of WA in recent years, and the proliferation of more affordable systems means the time is right for all public schools to be properly air conditioned," Premier Roger Cook said.

The schools expected to receive upgrades include Mount Helena PS, High Wycombe PS, Herne Hill PS, Dawson Park PS, Kalamunda PS, Mundaring PS, Ellenbrook Secondary College, Ashfield PS and Eden Hill PS

WA Labor candidate for Midland Steve Catania said he looks forward to delivering this commitment considering Midland can be warmer than other parts of Perth.

Under a separate investment, Mr Catania is promising to deliver more than \$1.5m to improve learning environments and upgrading facilities which will include air conditioning upgrades.

'These local commitments are great news for school communities at Guildford PS, Middle Swan PS and Moorditi Noongar Community College," he said.

MLA Shane Love said the eastern suburbs

should be prioritised as this area is hit hardest by extreme temperatures.

'Many are still relying on outdated and inadequate cooling systems, leaving students and staff to struggle in unbearable conditions," he said.

"The fact that Labor has had eight years in government and is only now making commit-

ments because an election is around the corner is farcical." MLA Libby Mettam said, "This is basic stuff

If he is successful in his bid to represent the Midland electorate he does not intend to follow suit.

"My intention is to be the member of Midland full time.

He is a long-term member of the Labor party – in the vicinity of 25 years.

"It is wonderful to have the opportunity

"He instilled in us – my family and me - the values of equity and compassion and community and that's why I became an advocate and that's why I became a lawyer myself.

"It's really about giving back to the community as much as possible.

If elected one of his strategies will be to invest in the local and grassroots level community groups, sporting clubs, schools

and the Swan View Agricultural Society, which puts on the Swan View show.

"Part of my election commitments are to invest in the agricultural society to be able to purchase equipment to be able to put on that historical show once again.

He said the skills he would bring to the role included advocating and getting across policies and issues

"My whole working life I've been an ad-

vocate for people - that's what I do on a daily basis.

"Also I have the capacity understand policy requirements both from a law and a legislative perspective.

"Part of being a lawyer is understanding issues and taking up those issues and fighting on behalf, in this case, for the commu-

nity.
"I've been passionate about that my whole life.

When he's been out doorknocking people have been concerned about the cost of living and access to healthcare.

Education is also another topic raised by people in the electorate.

He said in relation to health care there was a major election commitment on Monday, which if he was elected and the Cook government were re-elected would increase the capacity of beds in the emergency department for Midland Health Campus and create a mental health unit.

"This is different to what is currently being created at the Midland Health Campus through St John of God.

"There's more work to do but it's a really significant announcement.

The total announcement is \$140 million but the emergency department and outpatient is \$104m with scoping starting next year so that's really to address the emergency sector of that hospital, which is really

positive.
"This will include the triage, greater access for ambulance services as well to reduce ramping so it's going to be a really significant project."

He believes that in the area more broadly there is a fantastic opportunity to work with small business but also to be able to drive investment in the area - that can include creating further investment in the council particularly to create density including affordable housing initiatives such as the Tuohy Gardens project on the corner of Great Eastern Highway.

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# **Bassendean PS receives \$80,000 creative boost**

BASSENDEAN **Primary** School will receive \$80,000 from the Cook government as part of a state initiative to help schools connect Western Australian arts organisations and creative practitioners.

'The lessons and benefits students gain by incorporating creativity across curriculum areas are essential to every child's educational experience," Culture and the Arts Minister David Templeman said.

Twenty thousand dollars will be set aside for the school's The Bilya Project 2025: Stories of Us, while the remaining \$60,000 will go towards the Night/Time pro-

"Creative learning is important to allow stories to be told in new and imaginative ways," Bassendean PS primary educator and arts specialist Kylie Barr said.

The Bilya Project 2025 is an extension of the 2023 project which explores the relationship between residents and the local river.

"Most people in Bassendean see themselves as closely linked

to the river," Mrs Barr said.
"If you ask people where they're from, they say, 'Bassendean, we live by the river',"
The 2023 project involved

students collecting stories from community members of all ages and from different walks of life.

The new project will still involve this line of storytelling but will include the students working collaboratively with young WA artist, Kristy Nita Brown.

The collected stories will be

published in a book with the children's artwork alongside it in late term four.

The Night/Time project is in collaboration with local artists in the scope of multimedia, filmmaking, choreography, visual art and music.

"But through the magical space and time between dusk and dawn.

"It will incorporate lots of dif-

ferent ideas about constellations, the night sky, monsters underneath the bed and nocturnal animals.

The final product will be presented to the community in September as art installations in buildings along Old Perth Road.

Mrs Barr said people will be able to walk in and reimagine the old buildings through the projections, videos and physical artworks.

"It's about revitalising parts of Bassendean and letting the community see it in a different way.

'But also giving our kids the artistic experience of the community seeing their artwork.

'Not just their friends and family who come to an art exhibition in the school grounds."

Mrs Barr hopes the projects will encourage all Western Australians to explore the benefits of creativity.

# **Cassius Turvey** murder trial

THE four people accused of murdering teenager Cassius Turvey are on trial in the WA Supreme Court with the trial set to take about 10 weeks.

Jack Steven Brearley, Aleesha Louise Gilmore, Brodie Lee Palmer and Mitchell Colin Forth, who all deny murdering 15-yearold Cassius in October 2022, are appearing before WA's chief justice Peter Quinlan.

Mr Brearley, Ms Gilmore and Mr Forth along with Ethan Robert MacKenzie also face several charges relating to the alleged detention and assault of a 14-year-old and the alleged detention and stabbing of a 15-year-old.

Cassius was allegedly attacked with a metal pole in Middle Swan on October 13, 2022.

As reported in Three more charged with murder of Cassius Turvey (Echo News, January 28, 2023) Cassius spent five days in hospital before being sent home where he suffered a seizure and two strokes.

He was placed in an induced coma but died on October 23.

In the days and weeks after Cassius' death, thousands gathered across Australia at more than 40 vigils and rallies to remember his

# Nationals candidate Lisa Logan runs for Kalamunda

KALAMUNDA resident Lisa Logan is the Nationals' candidate for the seat of Kalamunda and says she wants to help the community by correcting government overreach and being the area's voice.

Mrs Logan has eight years of experience in the political landscape and previously managed a mixed cropping and sheep farm in the Wheatbelt before moving back to the

She said she wasn't a career politician and found herself drawn to the position through a combination of happenstance and a desire to help others.

"I didn't seek out local government," she

"At 18, I would have taken a job at the telecentre, but it just so happened that it was with the local shire," she said

"That then put me in touch with watching how the mechanisms of all of that works.

"I just learnt more about how important it is to get involved in these things, and how much I enjoyed it.'

Mrs Logan spent about 10 years in the Wheatbelt before moving back to the hills in

She said she loved the sense of pride residents had for the place they lived and that she hoped to protect it.

"We need to also then protect it for future generations and make sure that it is still a home in the hills and a home in the forest, and make sure that we do try and keep that

unique sense of identity," she said.
"That makes more people want to move here and when they do move here then they want more development and you've got to find the right balance.

"Everyone's come out against the North

Stoneville development.
"It doesn't need 2000 houses when you could have five acres or two and a half-acre lots out there instead of 400sqm lots.

"We're not against development but it's

about doing it sustainably and in the correct areas because one of the things that I find a lot out here is people want to stay and they're ready to downsize but we don't have that housing stock here.

"Developing in Kalamunda is difficult as we don't have the sewage and the water systems in place.

We've got a \$1 billion headworks funds that we've announced because we shouldn't have those barriers and we've got to be able

"We need to get rid of those financial barriers so we can grow more business and grow more tourism and continue to have that local economy thriving.

"Nobody wants a main street with no

Mrs Logan said another area of focus was

helping areas like Parkerville, Chidlow, Wooroloo and Beechina get better funding. "They're distinct, unique communities

and they are effectively small towns.

"They're a little bit closer to services, but they tend to be almost to the forgotten area because they are in what's called the metro area, so they miss out on a lot of funding for things that are considered regional, but their needs are the same.

"There's no different need to someone who lives in Wooroloo than to someone who lives 5km up the hill in Bakers Hill and vet there is distinct funding differences that they can tap into because they are regional.

"One of the things that I will be fighting for strongly here in Kalamunda is the idea of this regional boundary and how it doesn't exist anymore because McGowan changed the legislation.

There is no longer a metro city line in the sand and the creation of the federal seat of Bullwinkel shows that exactly because they have actually gone, 'well, no, you can cross

"So then having discrete funds and what is defined as regional needs to be looked at they've missed out on a lot of funding.

Mrs Logan said she always wanted to stand up for people and using lending her voice to others was her way of doing it.

"This isn't a flash in the pan idea for me – I wasn't, you know, tapped on the shoulder or pulled in," she said.

"This is my community where I live, and I will be back in four years' time to try again because this is important to me that our community is well represented."

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# Forrestfield man charged for impersonating DFES officer

DETECTIVES from the arson squad have charged a 60-year-old Forrestfield man as a result of their investigation into a person impersonating a Department of Fire and Emergency Service (DFES) officer.

About 7.35pm on Tuesday, January 14, the man attended a truck stop located on Abernethy Road in Kewdale.

It will be alleged whilst wearing overalls and a helmet with DFES embroidery, he got into a parked Holden Rodeo utility. The vehicle was marked with reflective signage and stickers which depict a DFES vehicle.

It will be further alleged, as the vehicle travelled on Baldwin Street in Kewdale, the man activated red, white and blue flashing lights and audible sirens installed on the car.

On Monday, January 20, arson squad detectives apprehended the man at a residence on Leake Street in Belmont.

During a subsequent search of the property, detectives located and seized the imitation DFES equipment and clothing, including the Holden Rodeo

# Swan View man fined \$4K after abusing his pet dog

\$4000 and banned from being in charge of an animal for two years after pleading guilty to beating his one-year-old Bull Arab Mastiff cross, Archie.

Last year Midland Magistrates Court heard at the offender's family home in June, he became angry with the dog for chewing a child's teddy bear.

He is said to have forcefully punched Archie several times with a closed fist while holding him by the throat, punching him several more times while holding him by the scruff of the neck (during which Archie urinated), and kicking him while wearing steel capped boots.

Onlookers described Archie as fearful and trying to run away. They attempted to intervene, and police were called. An RSPCA WA inspector attended the offender's property after receiving a cruelty complaint from WAPOL.

He denied the incident, stating he only softly

tapped Archie on the nose with the chewed toy. The inspector seized the dog, who continues to be cared for by the RSPCA. Magistrate Greg Benn

A 22-year-old Swan View man has been fined described the attack as "prolonged and vicious".

RSPCA WA Inspector Manager Kylie Green said Archie's case was heartbreaking.

"There is never a situation which warrants intentionally hurting an animal," she said.

"This kind of behaviour is not tolerated in our community, and I am pleased justice could be achieved for poor Archie today. Ramifications from treatment like this are pro-

found for the animals involved and Archie's ongoing behavioural difficulties are testament to that." The offender was sentenced under sections 19(1)

and 19(2)(a) of the Animal Welfare Act 2002.

He was found to have been cruel to the dog in that he maliciously beat him. The maximum penalty for a charge of animal cruelty is a \$50,000 fine and five years in prison.

He was also ordered to pay legal costs of \$1245 and reimburse the RSPCA \$936 for care costs.

'It's for the ones we've loved and lost," he said.


"I think having a purpose bigger than yourself, is one of the key drivers to fulfilment and improving consistency in training and in life.

The act no longer appropriately deals with our population and our issues to do with climate change," Ms Sewell said.


"We aren't getting the same rainfall as in 1914 and when we start drawing out of these water bores, that's when we get the brown-off across the hills with all the trees dying.

# February Hour of Power a story of resilience

THE Swan Chamber of Commerce's first 2025 Hour of Power networking event kicked off with a story of resilience and rediscovery by SLW Transport owners Shane and Leanne Willcox.

Mrs Willcox said she had come from a broken home in a small country town in New Zealand where she found it difficult to integrate at school.

"I hated school – I went to three different high schools from which each one I was asked to leave," she

"The third one I went to I was 14 and that's where I saw Shane, and I didn't really know who he was, but I saw him around the school.

'But the day I turned 15, I was asked to leave, much to my mum's

My mum then got me a job as a cleaner at the hospital and that started my working career, then I transitioned in from there, and I started working as a nurse aide.

"And then at 16, I met Shane, and we'd started dating and had gone out for six weeks, and I just thought I'd share this story because this is how incredible my husband is.

"So, about six weeks later, he comes over to my house and he said, 'Leanne, have you got something to tell me?

Mrs Willcox said she revealed she was having a baby.

"So, we'd been going out for six weeks, and I was about to have a baby in two weeks," she said.

"And I said to him, 'hey, look, I fully understand if you don't want to see me anymore', and he turned around and said to me, 'hey, I love you and I'll raise this baby with

Mr Willcox shared his side of the story about also coming from a broken home but finding a sense of purpose in being a provider for his new family.

Mr Willcox wanted to come to Australia to drive trucks and when he moved, he walked to a transport yard to find a job and was able to land a role as a supervisor through volunteering to repair their pallets while unemployed.

He said his vision was to own his own transport company, and by learning the skills of finance, budgeting and management he was able to set the foundation before he bought his truck.

Though there were challenges where the business had seemed to begin falling apart, through mentorship and continuing to learn and letting go of ego, Mr Willcox said the two were able to survive the challenges that came their way.

Mr Willcox said the secret to being together for a long time in both life and business came down to accepting each other for who they were entirely.

"People often ask us what's the secret to longevity?" he said.

"I am an imperfect husband, she is an imperfect wife and we do our very best to never give up on each other – that's the secret.

Mrs Willcox also shared a story about her first time attending the Swan Chamber of Commerce and feeling unsure about going inside, but then the life-changing outcome that moment of courage had for

When asked what the key driv-Mrs Willcox's change in self-confidence was, she said the answer was in embracing the uncomfortable.

"I've learned to be a confident woman, and I don't think I was that for a very long time," she said. 'But I've had to learn that's not

going to serve me, it's not going to serve people and I've got to get

"Don't get me wrong, I'm still uncomfortable at times but when you're uncomfortable, that's where the magic happens.

'I still have to make phone calls, and I have to talk to myself like, just pick up the phone and make the call', and sometimes you make the call and then they don't answer.

"But you've got to pluck up the courage again and again."

The new double-brick homes were built by Shelford Constructions and Swan Group WA, and are centrally located, close to public transport, shops, schools and recreational facilities.


The properties are now in the process of being offered to applicants from the public housing list.

# **Elsie Austin Oval change rooms update**

PLANNED upgrades to the Elsie Austin Oval Pavilion change rooms are progressing following detailed design work by Hodge Collard Preston Architects who have been engaged by the Shire of Mundaring.

The new designs will be based on building concepts developed previously with the community.

The improved facilities at the Mount Helena oval were made possible with a \$485,000 investment by the state government and will include upgraded and expanded change rooms, a universal change room/shower, a new umpire's room and larger storage room, improved kitchen/kiosk and upgraded entrance and surrounding outdoor areas.

All works will comply with modern accessibility requirements to include widened doorways and smooth pathways to increase universal accessibility, as well as lockable cubicles in the female change rooms and LED lighting throughout the building and between the carpark and building.

Of the total investment of \$485,000 made by the state government, \$410,000 has been allocated through the community sporting and recreation facilities fund (CSRFF), a program administered by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

The Shire of Mundaring aims to proceed with the upgrades in 2025/26 and is working with community groups to secure further funding for the capital works which are expected to cost around \$1.8 million to \$2 million.

Kalamunda MLA Matthew Hughes said the upgrade will support the high-profile and successful sports for all that already exists.


"We'll get comprehensive upgrades to the Elsie Austin Pavilion change rooms where the home clubs have successful, well-promoted and prioritised programs to encourage diverse participation in sports, including the StarKick All Abilities Foot-

Sport and Recreation Minister David Templeman said the state government was committed to supporting the development of sports and recreation facilities to meet the growing needs of communi-

"These upgraded facilities will improve accessibility for a broader range of community groups to be able to participate in sport and recreation activities and to benefit from a more active lifestyle.

THE WA Liberals have pledged \$5.5 million to provide four dialysis chairs, chemotherapy day beds with tele-chemotherapy capabilities, and outpatient specialist rooms for Kalamunda Hospital.

Liberal leader and opposition health spokesperson Libby Mettam said the additions will enhance the hospital's existing services and provide residents with easier access to critical care close to home.

The dialysis unit will offer local treatment for chronic kidney disease patients, tele-chemotherapy will allow cancer patients to receive care under remote specialist supervision, while the specialist outpatient rooms will support consultations in key medical fields, reducing the need for patients to travel to Perth for routine appointments," she said.

Three million dollars was also pledged to allow community pharmacies across the state to dispense specialist medications, which currently only qualify for a discount if they are dispensed through a hospital pharmacy.

Ms Mettam said the increasing complexity of medicines has seen a corresponding increase in the number of medicines that can only be accessed by patients at an affordable

price through a hospital pharmacy.

"This initiative will allow community pharmacists to expand their practice to include dispensing hospital prescriptions at the PBS discount price and charging the prescribing hospitals for the service," she said.

'It will mean that our hospital pharmacies can focus on critical clinical activities and preparing discharge medications, improving discharge times.'

Liberal candidate for Kalamunda Adam Hort said the promised new services at Kalamunda Hospital would have a significant community

Beyond health benefits, the hospital expansion will stimulate the local economy by creating jobs, increasing activity in Kalamunda's town centre, and supporting local businesses through increased foot traffic," he said.
"This proposal represents a trans-

formative opportunity to strengthen healthcare access and community well-being in Kalamunda.

# Low interest farming loans for new low emissions machinery

FARMERS for Climate Action (FCA) has welcomed news that low-emissions heavy equipment, trucks and utes will be eligible for low-interest loans under a new scheme supported by the federal government.

The emissions reduction incentive program for farmers will offer loans at 1.15 per cent less than market rates through NAB's arrangement with the government-owned Clean Energy Finance Corpo-

Hybrid, electric and hydrogen powered trucks, utes and machinery, will be eligible.

Some \$300 million is available under the program, with loans expected to largely be in the amount of \$1m to \$5m.

This means farmers could save in the order of \$50,000 a year on interest costs.

FCA CEO Natalie Collard said it was fantastic to see the government using the carrot rather than the stick with farmers on emissions reduction.

"This is exactly the sort of program our 8400

want to know how to reduce emissions whilst remaining profitable, and this program gives them a way to do that, if they choose. That's how you keep farmers farming. Credit where credit is due,' Ms Collard said.

'Farmers know why we need to reduce emissions - this year's bushfires remind us that climate change is hurting farmers now.

We warmly welcome this scheme because it gives farmers choice. If a farmer wants to choose a hydrogen, hybrid or electric powered machinery, the farmer can choose to take a low-interest loan to get it. As the technology proves itself, other farmers can also choose low-emissions machin-

'Australia's farmers have a tradition of clean, green farming, and we want to continue that tradition so our kids can farm forever.

Born in a rural village in Thailand, brand owner Wilai Carney said the villagers had to find creative

Mrs Carney said the women in her family grew silkworms which were then used to make fabric

"I grew up with silkworm in the house and we fed the silkworm with mulberry," she said.

Mrs Carney said she doesn't remember when she learned the technique of how to make silk, it was just part of her culture.

"We don't learn, we just become part of it."

At 12-years-old, Mrs Carney said her life changed when she was taken from her village to

become a child labourer at a clothing factory. Mrs Carney remembered how inhaling the strong chemicals at the factory made her feel diz-

"I came from fresh air at the village.

"And then I'm suddenly put in the factory.

"But you can't say much, you still have to do what you have to do.'

She moved to Perth in 2004 after she decided with her husband that Australia would give them a better life to build a family.

After she had her first child, she said she wanted to find some way to do work because working made her days meaningful.

She reflected on the skills she'd gained throughout her life, which led her to create Wilai Fashion in 2009.

Mrs Carney's sister also flew from Thailand to help start the brand and the pair experimented

with different fabrics such as silk and cotton.

As an immigrant, Mrs Carney said it's tough launching a business in this industry.

"But I'm persistent," she said.
"I'm not sure if I have a fashion mindset but I love to create for women.'

Mrs Carney hopes her designs will complement the power already within women.

She said events like Perth Makers Market are especially important for small businesses because it helps build connections with customers and other business owners.

# WA Livestock Exporters' Assn congratulate Cook's advocacy

**THE Western Australian Livestock Exporters** Association (WALEA) has congratulated Premier Roger Cook for his advocacy to the federal government in opposing the 'Nature Positive' legislation leading to its withdrawal and its opposition to the live sheep ban.

In an open letter to the Premier WALEA stated the live sheep ban policy was driven by extreme activists and sadly the federal government had become a mouthpiece for them.

The letter outlined that farmers in WA are suffering at the hands of the federal government and that the WA sheep flock declined by 25 per cent in 2024, and it is expected to reduce in 2025 to around six million – a 50 per cent decrease in two

WALEA said two major abattoirs have closed in WA since the federal government came to power due to concerns about future viability and that wool production in WA is at its lowest since the 1920's due to the flock liquidation, while shearers are reporting their businesses have dropped by 30 per cent in the last 12 months.

"The reason for these outcomes is simple, a viable WA sheep industry needs competition from three markets – meat processing, wool production and live exports," the letter stated.

"You take one of these away then the viability of sheep production in WA is damaged and all three of these industries will suffer dire consequences because of the ban. This means less money flowing into local businesses and therefore less people being able to remain in those communities.

"For the WA flock to be self-sustaining it reguires a minimum of 10 million sheep and the flock has already dipped well below this. WALEA is greatly concerned that this policy may not only spell the end of the live sheep export industry, but the sheep processing and wool industries as well.

"Even if a transition was possible – the federal government has given no time and superficial support. Three years does not allow time for businesses to restructure their flocks. \$139m barely scratches the surface of the economic loss of this ban, particularly when considering that only approximately \$45m is earmarked for producers and the supply chain.

"Good governments do not shut down industries that support regional businesses and communities for political purposes.'

**THE Western Australian Electoral Commission** is calling on 18-30-year-olds to check they are enrolled for the WA State election, with more than 10 per cent of eligible Western Australians in this age group not enrolled to vote.

The latest data shows 89 per cent of Western Australians aged 18-30 years who are eligible to join the electoral roll are currently enrolled to vote, making this age group the most under-represented cohort.

In comparison, 94 per cent of eligible Western Australians aged 30-39 are enrolled to vote, increasing to an estimated 99 per cent of eligible voters aged 70+

Electoral Commissioner Robert Kennedy is urging young people to recognise the importance of their participation.

"This election is your chance to influence the policies and decisions that will help shape the future of our state," Mr Kennedy said.

"Young voters have a unique opportunity to champion the issues that matter most to their generation - whether climate action, housing, education, job opportunities or the cost of living. Voting provides a huge opportunity to impact the decisions that affect your life, so your vote goes a long way to shape your future."

The WA Electoral Commission has launched targeted initiatives including social media campaigns to engage younger voters and break down the common barriers to participation.


'We understand that many young people may be voting for the first time or unsure of the process, and we're here to make it easy and accessible for everyone," Mr Kennedy said.
